# Comet boys will look to replace two graduated scoring threats

The Comets boys basketball team will have to find new scoring threats in 2017-18 as Albany lost their top two scorers from a year ago.

Albany went 10-13 last year and 4-8 in Six Rivers Eastern division play. The Comets lost to Juda 68-47 in a

WIAA Division 5 regional quarterfinal matchup.

The two leading scorers that Albany must replace are Brock Gilkes and Connor Trow. Gilkes averaged 13 points and five rebounds per game. Trow averaged 12 points and three rebounds per game. This dynamic duo knocked down a combined 64 threes

with each respectively drilling 32 long balls. Their ability to stretch the defense will be missed this year.

Albany returns five players with varsity experience including two starters. One of those starters is junior Josh Dahl, who averaged five points and four rebounds per game. Junior Corbin Kelley poured in eight points and three rebounds per game. Kelley showed glimpse of his outside shooting abilities as he knocked down 13 threes last year and will be counted on to be an even bigger offensive contributor this upcoming season.

Some other key returning players include junior Jamison Stauffacher, senior Garrett Hlavachek and senior Logun Parker. Another player that figures to play crucial role off the bench is senior Josh Shell. Shell's rebounding and shooting skills could make a big impact for the Comets this year.

One strength for this year's team will be their quickness. This year's squad will not have a lot of height. As a result this undersized team will have to rely on their backcourt to generate scoring opportunities. Some other strengths for the 2017-18 squad will be defense and team chemistry.

One challenge that this team will face throughout the season is a lack of depth. Albany plans to use two freshmen off the bench. One freshman is Luke Johnson, who will look to provide energy off the bench. Another freshman that'll look to make a contribution is Clay Hulbert. Hulbert's shooting skills could be a huge asset for the Comets.

Albany enters 2017-18 with two goals. The first goal is to improve on last year's performance. The second goal is to end the season towards the top of the conference.

## Ringhand: Reason to be troubled by Foxconn earnings report

Taiwan's Foxconn, the world's largest contract electronics manufacturer and a major Apple supplier, posted a 39 percent drop in third-quarter earnings.

Foxconn attributed the drop in earnings to delay with the introduction of Apple's iPhone X.

Foxconn, formally known as Hon Hai Precision Industry Co, said third-quarter earnings came in at T\$21.03 billion (\$698 million), compared with T\$34.64 billion (\$1.12 Billion) a year earlier, while revenue for the quarter was flat.

As a result of this report, Reuters noted that Foxconn stock slid down 3% on Wednesday.

"The earnings report certainly helps explain Governor Walker's rush to get the Foxconn contract signed before the announcement of bad news. Foxconn knew when their earnings numbers were going public.

The Governor negotiated this deal in secret, put us on the hook for \$3 billion, and needs to take responsibility to make sure that Wisconsin taxpayers don't get the short end of this deal."

## Cost-Share sign-up for conservation practices announced

The Green County Land and Water Conservation Department is accepting applications for soil conservation and water quality practices.

Practices approved for the Land and Water Conservation Department are paid on a 70% cost-share per practice basis. The exception to this rule is for nutrient management. This practice is paid on a flat rate of 28 dollars per acre.

A few examples of practices that

are offered through both programs are: well decommissioning, grassed waterways, manure storage, barnyard runoff control systems, stream bank improvement, cattle and equipment crossings, roof gutters, and diversions.

The Albany School Board met Nov. 13.

It began with a Student Council report by Emma Guenther and Lily Brewer. They have gotten names from Valley Park Assisted Living for a Christmas List.

In the administrative reports Connie Gregerson 4K-12 principal, mentioned a lot of activities that had taken place since the last meeting. There was PTO Family Night, Financial Aid Night, and a Halloween Parade in the Elementary School on Oct. 31, Principal's Challenge in which she had to sit in a rocking chair and ended up reading in every classroom from 4K-through 5th grade, Veterans Day, Parant Teacher Conferences and Book Fair.

Amy Vesperman, School Superintendent, mentioned the start of school winter sports. The girls would play their first basketball game on No-

vember 14th. "Practice is going really well for them," said Vesperman.

Gregerson said that they did a parent survey in which she found parents feel really positive.

They also discovered that 91 percent prefer e-mail when trying to find out information about the school.

The Juda boys basketball team will enter a new era in 2017-18 as Kurtis Mansfield will lead the Panthers program.

Juda is coming off a successful season going 15-9 last year and 6-6 in Six Rivers eastern division play. Juda dropped a thrilling 54-51 decision to Pecatonica in a WIAA Division 5 regional semifinal contest.

The Panthers return just 36 percent of their offense from a year ago. Matt Schmitt poured in 15 points, 13 rebounds and two assists per game. Some other key losses that Juda must replace are Joe Rackow and Skyler Stuckey. Rackow averaged nine points and Stuckey contributed eight points last year.

Not all the Panthers' scoring is gone, as the Panthers top scorer from a year ago, senior guard Keagen Haffele is back. Haffele racked up 16 points, four

rebounds and four assists per game in 2016-17.

The Panthers offense will run through Haffele as he will be the Panthers go to player in 2017-18. Senior Luke Skoumal, senior Dakota Davis, senior Clayton Mahlkuch, senior Clayton Hale, senior Almanzo Friedly and junior Quinton Kammerer are key returning experienced players.

Mansfield knows the Panthers will encounter scoring droughts in the half-court offense, as a vast majority of their offense from a year ago is gone. Juda plans to use a quick hitter offense and spread defenses out to attack the rim.

It only costs you \$4.50 round-trip to any location inside Green County. If you are looking for a day trip to Madison or Janesville, we can get you there too. Each month we take a trip to these locations.

Once again, you tell the driver where you need to go and they make sure you get there, safe and sound. These trips cost a little more, round-trip it is \$10 to go to Madison and \$8 to go to Janesville.

Our driver escort program is another great way to get around during the winter. Our driver escorts will pick up at your house and get you

right to your doctor appointments, to the bank, or to do some quick shopping. The cost for these trips vary on location and the cost is reasonable, especially when you don't have to worry about finding park spots at the doctor's office or at the grocery stores.

# Roth summarizes budget, looks ahead to Dec. county board

The Green County Board passed the 2018 budget at the November County Board meeting. There was nothing surprising or out of the ordinary in the budget, nor in the discussions before voting. The total budget for 2018 is \$63,479,667 but with total revenues, surplus, and a sum from the undesignated general fund applied, the net tax levy is \$15,789,498. This is an increase of \$439,935 from the 2017 net tax levy.

The majority of the business at the meeting was focused on the budget and passing the budget. There will be a presentation on the status of the roads in Green County at the December County Board meeting; that will take place Tuesday, Dec. 12 at 7 p.m. at the Historic Courthouse in Monroe.

Considering the wheel tax information that was provided to the board last month, I foresee discussion in the future about the funding options we have for our roads in Green County.

As the cost of repairs and maintenance on the roads increases - which is painfully clear during budget time - and the sources of funding are being reduced, we need to find ways to bridge the difference. As always, the public is welcome at the County Board meetings, and the upcoming road status presentation will be very informative. If you have thoughts about the roads, a wheel tax, or other, you are welcome to contact your County Board Supervisor.

All County Board seats are up for election/re-election this spring. If you are interested in running for a seat on the County Board, you can pick up papers at the County Clerk's office beginning Friday, Dec. 1. You will need to get 25 nomination signatures and return the papers to the Clerk's office by 5 p.m. on Tuesday, Jan. 5, 2018.

I encourage everyone interested to run. If you have questions about the board, talk to any of the current Supervisors. I am sure they are all willing to talk and share their experiences with you. Representing your neighbors and working to make Green County such a wonderful place is quite fulfilling. Please consider it.

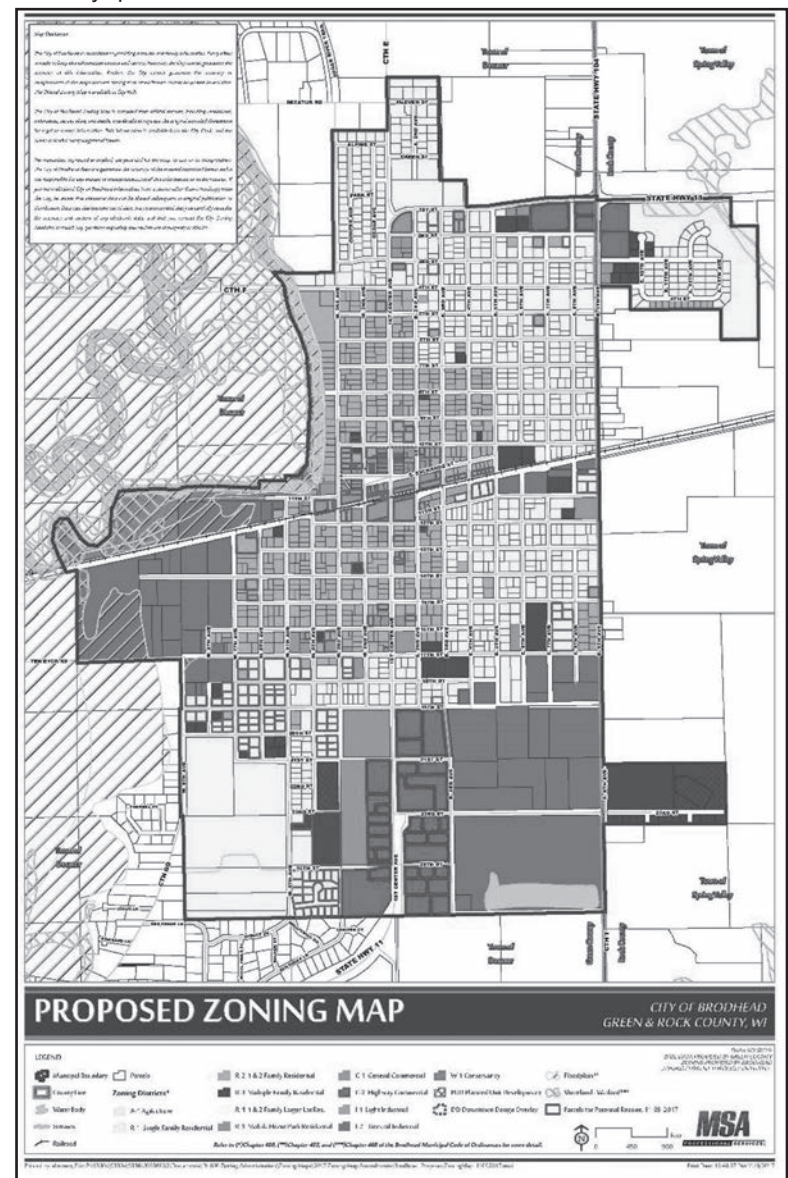

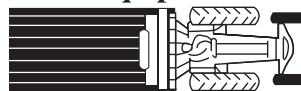
