DNR putting Grande cheese, whey wastewater operations under one perm

State staff charged with protecting water resources are in the process of consolidating pollution discharge permitting for the Grande Cheese opera-

Grande added a whey processing plant to its ricotta and mozzarella cheese production in Juda through purchase from PGP International in August

Steps that Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources wastewater engineering staff members are now taking put permitting for both plants under a single permit.

in response to the Independent Register last week, "since the cheese plant and whey processing plant were not owned by the same company.

"The two treatment plants will be placed under one permit now. Since they will combine their discharge and take samples to determine environmental compliance from a centralized location, ensuring environmental compliance will be easier for the department and the facility," Well said.

Wisconsin Environmental Law Advocates reached accords with Grande and a previous owner of the whey plant called Protient back in 2008.

The two companies operating on "They previously discharged from County Highway S north of Juda agreed to cut phosphorous loading and

non-point source pollution in the Lower Sugar River Watershed.

Protient Inc. one year later merged with PGP International Inc., which in turn sold the whey operation to Grande in 2013.

Protient, Inc. manufactures and markets dairy proteins for food, dairy. health, sports, and animal feed markets, according to Bloomberg. The company offers milk protein isolates and concentrates, whey protein isolates and concentrates, and lactose.

It also provides contract manufacturing, custom formulation and consumer private label packaging services for powdered sport and nutritional bever-

The company serves weight management, beverage, bakery, snacks, and confectionary markets. Protient, Inc. was founded in 1998 and is headquartered in St. Paul. Minnesota

A list of landowners in four counties that take wastes from Grande Cheese and whey production in Juda runs 13 pages long. Parcels as small as 2 acres to properties larger than 300 acres take the discharge in Green, Rock, Dane and Outagamie counties.

Some entries on the list show dated soil analysis of the wastewater application; some list nothing.

"These plants primarily require microbial activity to break down the organic waste from the cheese making processes and wash water used to clean and sanitize their equipment," said Wells, DNR basin engineer for the state monitoring and reporting district.

"The waste being land applied is waste that is not effectively treated in traditional industrial wastewater treatment plants due to the high organic load and oxygen requirements needed by microbes to sufficiently break down this waste.

"Solids and microbes that settle from wastewater treatment plant processes are also land applied to provide nutrients to the soil. Vegetation thrives on the higher nutrient concentrations from the land-spread waste and the microbial activity in healthy soils effectively break down the waste and making it readily available to vegetation that is land applied."

This is why Wisconsin farmers generally accept whey and cheese processing waste as a type of fertilizer for their crops, Wells said. "Currently, the cheese plant has a septage hauler spread its waste on fields approved for the licensed hauler to spread on," Wells said.

Limitations and conditions the DNR believes adequately protect the North Fork Juda Branch and waters draining the land application base are included in the newly combined permit.

"I believe that all limit conditions set forth in the permit are there to protect the receiving water body to the fullest extent possible," Wells told the Independent Register last week.

"When I visited both wastewater treatment plants this winter they were being maintained and operated well, with high quality effluent leaving the treatment facilities," Wells said.

"The operators of the facilities take pride in continuously improving treatment processes and improving the quality of their effluent by providing an optimal environment for the microbes or "bugs" that treat the wastewater coming into their facilities.

able surface water discharge permit, the federal Environmental Protection Agency is allowed up to 90 days to submit comments or objections regarding this permit determination.

If five or more people petition the DNR, outlining in detail areas of concern, staff may schedule a public informational hearing, according to a department release.

The DNR has made the draft permit, a fact sheet, and a permit application available for inspection in its Madison or Fitchburg offices. Permit information and the list of landowners receiving discharge are also available electronically.

Wells is responsible for regular inspections of the facility and for ensuring Grande's compliance with its wastewater discharge permit.

"The effluent concentrations and total amount of material allowed to be discharged will not be lessened due to increases in production," Wells said, of Grande's plant, which has been expanding. "If the volume of the effluent goes up, material concentrations must be reduced to offset the increase in flow, "

Deadline to claim Wisconsin Child Sales Tax Rebate is Monday

ing in the filing period, the Wisconsin 15 and July 2. Department of Revenue (DOR) is urging eligible claimants to file for their \$100 per child sales tax rebate.

Claims must be filed by Monday, July 2, but the revenue department encourages those who are eligible not to wait until the last minute. DOR estimates that roughly 670,000 households, with 1.22 million children in total, are eligible to file a claim.

"Our message for people who are eligible to claim this rebate is to do it now," said Department of Revenue Secretary Richard Chandler. "It's easy to put this off and think you'll do it later. However, after July 2, we are unable to accept claims, so if you're eligible, don't wait."

Do you have a dependent child or children? You're likely eligible for a \$100 (per child) sales tax rebate.

A qualified child must be under age 18 on Dec. 31, 2017, a dependent of the claimant for tax year 2017, a Wisconsin resident on Dec. 31, 2017, and a United States





Rock County issues water quality warning

County Public Health Department last week indicated high levels of E. Coli bacteria in several streams and rivers in Rock County.

The Public Health Department routinely conducts water testing of beaches and recreational surface waters during warm weather months and provides advisories of conditions that might warrant health risks to recreational water users.

Sampling last Tuesday, June 19, indicated E. Coli levels in excess of 1000 colony forming units per 100 mls of water at 16 locations.

These included the Rock River, Yahara River, Sugar River, Badfish Creek, Turtle Creek, Lake Leota, and several other smaller streams and creeks.

At this level of E. Coli bacteria, surface water may not be suitable for recreational activities that could result in water ingestion due to the potential risk of intestinal illness. Recent rains have resulted in signifi-

cant runoff that may be contributing to the high bacteria levels, according to the health department. A complete list of results and loca-

1.1 AUTHORITY. These regulations are adopted under the authority granted by s. 101.65, Wisconsin Statutes

1.2 PURPOSE. The purpose of this ordinance is to promote the general health, safety and welfare and to maintain required local uniformity with the administrative and technical requirements of the Wisconsin Uniform Dwelling Code.

1.3 SCOPE. The scope of this ordinance includes the construction and inspection of one- and twofamily dwellings built since June 1, 1980.

1.3.1 Notwithstanding s. SPS 320.05, the scope also includes the construction and inspection of alterations and additions to oneand two- family dwellings. Because such projects are not under state jurisdiction, petitions for variance and final appeals under ss. SPS 320.19 and 320.21, respectively, shall be decided by the municipal board of appeals. Petitions for variance shall be decided per s. SPS 320.19 (intro.) so that equivalency is maintained to the intent of the rule being petitioned. As the board of appeals approves petitions for variance, the chief inspector is granted the power to apply the results to similar circumstances by precedent.

1.3.2 Notwithstanding s. SPS 320.05, the scope also includes the construction and inspection of detached garages serving one and two family dwellings. The building structure and any heating, electrical or plumbing systems shall comply with the Uniform Dwelling Code. Petitions for variance and appeals shall be handled as in the previous paragraph.

WISCONSIN UNIFORM DWELLING CODE ADOPTED. The Wisconsin Uniform Dwelling Code. Chs. SPS 320-325 of the Wisconsin Administrative Code, and all amendments thereto, is adopted and incorporated by reference and shall apply to all buildings within the scope of this ordinance.

1.5 BUILDING INSPECTOR. There is hereby created the position of Building Inspector, who shall administer and enforce this ordinance and shall be certified by the Department of Safety and Professional Services, as specified by Wisconsin Statutes, Section 101.66 (2), in the category of Uniform Dwelling Code Construction Inspector. Additionally, this or other assistant inspectors shall possess the certification categories of UDC HVAC, UDC Electrical, and UDC Plumbing. 1.6 BUILDING PERMIT RE-

QUIRED. If a person alters a building in excess of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) in any 12-month period, adds onto a building in excess of ten square feet in any 12-month period, or builds or installs a new building, within the scope of this ordinance, they shall first obtain a building permit for such work from the building inspector. Any structural changes or major changes to mechanical systems that involve extensions shall require permits if over the foregoing thresholds. Restoration or repair of an installation to its previous code-compliant condition as determined by the building inspector is exempted from permit requirements. Residing, re-roofing, finishing of interior surfaces and installation of cabinetry shall be exempted from permit requirements. 1.7 BUILDING PERMIT FEE. The

building permit fees shall be determined by resolution. 1.7.1 If a building permit is not ob-

tained prior to commencement of construction, the above fees shall be doubled. 1.8 INSPECTIONS. The building

inspector(s) shall keep a log of all inspections completed. 1.9 PENALTIES. The enforcement of this section and all other laws and ordinances relating to building shall be by means of the withhold-

ing of building permits, imposition

of forfeitures and injunctive action. Forfeitures shall be not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$1,000.00 for each day of noncompliance. 1.10 EFFECTIVE DATE. This or-

dinance shall be effective June 25, 2018, upon passage and publication as provided by law. The foregoing ordinance was duly



Small grains growers, buyers to network in upcoming field day

EDITOR

For a vegetable crop producer, finding time to grow small grains is challenging.

Winter wheat planting in the fall and its harvest mid-summer tax fresh producer growers, who are busy the same months tending many other plant varieties at peak season.

Small grains – oats, wheat, rye, barley – once dominated agricultural plantings across Wisconsin and other Midwest-

While countries such as Canada and Finland have subsidized production of these cereal crops, federal supports in the United States have long favored corn and soybeans.

Oat production, for instance, fell nationally another 24 percent last year, to 49.4 million bushels. Wisconsin's harvests and acres planted to small grains have continued to dwindle, too. Only 85,000 acres in the state were planted to oats last year. In 1987, farmers were growing oats on 830,000 acres.
