





Orioles keep Panthers at bay




Briana Crull tries to tip the ball past Argyle's Jena Saalsaa.

Orfordville Board of Appeals discusses multiple variance requests

Thursday before the Board of Appeals. Board members discussed three variance requests.

Bob Dahl appeared for second time before the board to further discuss a request he submitted last month. Dahl's request involved installing a four-foot fence in his front yard that would fall 15 feet from the center of the road. A current ordinance requires front yard fences to be 35 feet back from the center of the road.

Dahl provided the board with a copy of his Certified Survey Map showing property lines for 138 South Walnut Street. Clerk Sherri Waege provided an aerial photo from the Village Engineer, showing measurements for the proper vision triangle for the street intersection.

Dahl explained that based on the certified map, he is most likely not going to pursue the front yard fence due to only being able to build the fence 20 feet out from the front. No further action was taken by the board on this matter.

Kris and Deb Johnson had two separate variances brought before the board. The property involved is located at 313 North Main Street. The first request is to be allowed to have a second garage. Kris explained his hopes in building a second detached garage on his property. A current ordinance allows one detached garage and one attached garage. Kris has an existing detached garage.

Kris explained that due to the set up of the existing garage, he is not able to attach the structure to his house. A motion by Terry Gerber was seconded by Jason Knox to grant the request to Kris for two detached garages.

A second request from the Johnson's involved exceeding the square footage allowed for a detached garage. Kris wants to build a detached garage of 1,800 square feet. A current ordinance allows a detached garage as long as the

New and old business merged last combination square footage of a detached garage with an accessory building does not exceed 30 percent of the rear yard or 936 square feet.

Kris explained he obtained a building permit for an accessory structure of 240 square feet, leaving 696 square feet for a detached garage. The new detached garage, as Kris explained, will be a pole shed building with gravel floor and sliding doors. He also explained that his back yard is 25,645 square feet, with 30 percent being 7,694 square feet.

Kris said he has a camper and tractors that he is planning to store in the new garage. A neighbor of Kris, Gerald Hexom, was present for the meeting and addressed how Kris would gain access to the new building. Kris explained that his plan was to use a cutout on the south side of his property, but does not plan on putting in a driveway. A village ordinance only allows one driveway per residential property.

Board member Gary Phillips said he is not in favor of a pole building in a back yard, regardless of the size. Phillips also reminded those present that the ordinance requires a building to be architecturally compatible with the principle building.

Gerber was in favor of granting the 1,800 square foot building. He believed that it would assist Kris in cleaning up the property.

Board members discussed what the definition of architecturally correct. Phillips noted that the building inspector makes the decision when the permit is issued.

A motion by Gerber with a second by Knox to grant a variance to Kris Johnson for a 1,800 square for pole shed due to the square footage of the back yard of his property. The variance also requires the siding of the building to be the same color as the house and overhead doors to be placed on the







Green County Board discusses wind farm

DISTRICT 24 REPRESENTATIVE

How do you feel about wind farms and wind energy? At the Sept. 11 Green County Board meeting, EDF Renewable Energy gave a presentation about a 24-turbine wind farm they are considering in Jefferson Township here in Green County, called the Sugar River Wind Project.

I have always been a supporter of renewable energy but there are still many questions to be answered and impacts to be considered.

EDF Renewable Energy's presentation about the Sugar River Wind Project covered the benefits to Green County, the project overview, and the proposed schedule. The project has ended its feasibility stage and is in the development stage.

The notice of application for the Sugar River Wind Project is expected to be issued in October, and the application filed with Green County by the end of 2018. There were several questions posed by county board members at the end of the presentation, and more questions have been formed since.

As presented this would be a 25 year project, the power generated would be put on the grid, the results of the studies (environ-

mental, flicker, noise, communication, etc) are part of the application, this project is expected to bring in a tax revenue of \$258,640 per year between the county and the Town of Jefferson,

It is expected that there will be about \$600,000 per year paid in rent and payments, there would be over 150 temporary construction jobs during the six to nine month construction period and up to five long term permanent positions during operation. The wind farm would generate up to 65 MW

(Previously called the CEO Breakfast, GCDC is changing the name of the event to be more inclusive of Green County business leadership teams.)

The breakfast is held at Bailey's Run Vineyard, N8523 Klitzke Road, New Glarus. Breakfast and networking begin at 7 a.m., followed by Johnson's presentation at 7:30 a.m. with time following for questions and a tour of Bailey's Run Vineyard. RSVP to GCDC at 608-328-9452 or gcdc@tds.net by Oct. 8.

In her presentation, Johnson discusses what it really takes to build a successful modern manufacturing company and national food brand based in a rural community in Wisconsin. She will also share many lessons for other entrepreneurs and rural communities who are looking to create their own successes.

Objections to the amount or valuation of property shall first be made in writing and filed with the clerk of the board of review within the first 2 hours of the board's first scheduled meeting, except that, upon evidence of extraordinary circumstances, the board may waive that requirement up to the end of the 5th day of the session or up to the end of the final day of the session if the session is less than 5 days. The board may require objections to the amount or valuation of property to be submitted on forms approved by the Department of Revenue, and the board shall require that any forms include stated valuations of the property in question. Persons who own land and improvements to that land may object to the aggregate valuation of that land and improvements to that land, but no person who owns land and improvements to that land may object only to the valuation of that land or only to the valuation of improvements to that land. No person may be allowed in any action or proceedings to question the amount or valuation of property unless the written objection has been filed and that person in good faith presented evidence to the board in support of the objections and made full disclosure before the board, under oath, of all of that person's property liable to assessment in the district and the value of that property. The requirement that objections be in writing may be waived by express action of the board.

When appearing before the board of review, the objecting person shall specify in writing the person's estimate of the value of the land and of the improvements that are the subject of the person's objection and specify the information that the person used to arrive at that estimate.

No person may appear before the board of review, testify to the board by telephone, or object to a valuation if that valuation was made by the assessor or the objector using the income method of valuation, unless no later than 7 days before the first meeting of the board of review the person supplies the assessor with all the information about income and expenses, as specified in the assessor's manual under s. 73.03 (2a), Wis. stats—that the assessor requests. The Town of Decatur has an ordinance for the confidentiality of information about income and expenses that is provided to the assessor under this paragraph that provides exceptions for persons using information in the discharge of duties imposed by law or the duties of their officer or by order of a court. The information that is provided under this paragraph, unless a court determines before the first meeting of the board of review that it is inaccurate, is not subject to the right of inspection and copying under s. 19.35 (1), Wis. Stats.

The board shall hear upon oath, by telephone, all ill or disabled persons who present to the board a letter from a physician, surgeon, or osteopath that confirms their illness or disability. No other persons may testify by telephone unless the Board, in its discretion, has determined to grant a property owner's or their representative's request to testify under oath by telephone or written statement.

No person may appear before the board of review, testify to the board by telephone, or contest the amount of any assessment unless, at least 48 hours before the first meeting of the board, or at least 48 hours before the objection is heard if the objection is allowed under s.70.47 (3) (a), Wis. stats., that person provides to the clerk of the board of review notice as to whether the person will ask for the removal of a member of the board of review and, if so, which member, and provides a reasonable estimate of the length of time the hearing will take.

Orfordville Lutheran Church to celebrate 150 years

Lyle Amundson worked the last three vears to organize and construct a book about the history of the Orfordville Lutheran Church. He managed to produce a detailed and interesting book just in time for the church's 150th anniversary.

Amundson served several terms as President of the congregation and was on the cemetery board for over 20 years as a secretary treasurer. He is also a member of several historical societies. When asked how and why he began to dig into the history of the church, Amundson said, "When you wanted to look at an early church record, whether it was a marriage, baptism, confirmation, the books are extremely fragile. I think some of the quality of ink, at certain times when they were recorded, has faded. I just thought it was in need. If we were going to keep those records; that we would need to digitize them.'

All of the church records, up through 1973, were put on the computer and out onto a computer disk. This allows the old record books to stay in their current condition and minimizes the risk of damaging them.

With the 150th anniversary coming up, Amundson worked to get as many biographies and autobiographies of former pastors from Orfordville Lutheran. He was able to obtain a biography from every pastor that served the church. This includes 14 part time and 23 full time

Amundson explained that Orfordville Lutheran Church formed when the congregation of Luther Valley Church split in 1868. The split occurred as a result of different views on slavery.

Amunson said that Claus Magelssen's great grandson is attending the 150th celebration next weekend. Claus Magelssen, deceased, was Orfordville Lutheran's first pastor after the congregation split. He served as pastor for 24 years. Omenson said that being able to visit with the members of previous pastors was quite interesting and enjoyable.

Lars Monsen Gimmestad served the church for 20 years beginning in 1918. His grandson and sister are attending the celebration next weekend.

Amundson says his next project is to transfer records from 1974 through 2018 up to date and digitized.




