Orfordville Police Committee talks clean up, chickens and updates

Orfordville's Police Committee held a meeting last week to properties, chickens in the village, and regular day-to-day operation updates.

Police Chief Brian Raupp opened the meeting with a situation regarding property cleanliness of 402 West Brodhead Street in Orfordville. The residents of the property have recently moved out and left behind a large mess that included mattresses and various debris.

Jeb McMahon purchased the property on October 10 and has picked up most of the mess. McMahon is working on cleaning out the garage, mowing, and hauling out a pile of metal.

Josh Clark, of 403 South Richards Street, spoke out regarding chickens being allowed in the village. He explained that most of the surrounding cities have ordinances allowing chickens and ducks.

Clark explained to the committee that his family likes to be self-sustaining by having their own garden. Having chickens allows Clark to have fresh eggs for his family.

He also went on to state that the noise from chickens is no comparison to dogs barking or noise from residents themselves. Clark pointed out that ducks are good for insect foraging and they live longer to provide more eggs. Clark seeks the opportunity to teach his children responsibility and teach them about composting for the garden.

McMahon added to Clark's explanation stating that he did some research about chickens and was surprised to learn that chickens were the third most popular events for backyards, with grilling and gardening listed as first and second. He also explained that backyard chickens are very popular and that his business caters to the smaller backyard chicken owners.

Committee member Jason Knox stated that historically, the government encourages self-sustainability by having backyard chickens.

Chief Raupp explained that Brodhead changed their ordinance to allow backyard chickens and it has not been a problem, aside from the expected objections. Chief Raupp offered to contact other municipalities to get more information about their policies. Brandon Klitzman of 316 Hickory Court presented a concern for obliging by the village's ordinance for electrical and building requirements. Clerk Sherri Waege assured that a coop or pen is considered an accessory building like an outdoor shed. Current ordinance allows one accessory building. Terry Gerber mentioned that in Evansville, it is a requirement for chicken structures to be inspected and can require fencing. Terry Bennett included that computers are an excellent source for mosquito control. Chief Raupp is maintaining ordinances from other cities and is bringing them to the November meeting. In other news • Officer Charlie Worm started field training.

• Chief Raupp explained that there is a need for additional part-time officers.

• A motion was approved for Chief Raupp to advertise for the positions on the state Wilenet system.

• Chief Raupp is ordering vest for the crossing guards that says Crossing Guard on them. This is the responsibility of the police department.

 Chief Raupp is working with the village attorney on the workman's comp liability for a reserve police program.

• A high volume of open records requests within the last two weeks is causing Chief Raupp to think about streamlining open records requests to be more time efficient.

• An upgrade copier/fax machine is needed for 2019. The upgrade machine provides proof of service, which is required for warrants for blood draws dealing with drunk driving. The warrants are being handled by fax only.

• The department is still having issues with the Sleet/Spillman system software. The new windows programs do not support the older software very well.

• The Village is participating in a National Drug Take back Day on Saturday, Oct. 27 from 9 a.m. to Noon. This is a chance to promote the new prescription box at the police department.

• A training seminar is taking place on Friday, Oct. 26 for the Portable Breath Test training. The department is hosting the seminar.

· Chief Raupp made the committee aware of an altercation that occurred in back where he needed assistance and the radio would not work. The metal building has caused radio issues in the past. In this instance, Chief Raupp had to hold the individual down and use his cell phone to get help instead of his radio.

Knox told Chief Raupp to look into the problem as it poses an obvious safety issue. Chairman Olson explained that Chief Wickstrum replaced equipment to address the issue. Clerk Waege is looking into who did the work at that time.

Chief Raupp is working to correct the language of the contract, including paying holidays, as they occur, not as one lump sum in November.

Town of Decatur to address referenda questions on November ballot

TOWN OF DECATUR RELEASE

Voters in the Town of Decatur have two local referenda on their November ballot. A question curbside pick-up of garbage and recyclables, and a question regarding the Clerk/Treasurer position are being presented on the ballot.

The Town Board is looking at providing curbside pick-up of garbage and recycling to all dwellings in the Town of Decatur. The Board has been soliciting bids from haulers and has selected Badgerland Disposal as the provider, if the referendum passes.

The cost is \$12.55 per month per household for the first year of a seven-year contract with a slight increase each year for the balance of the contract. However, the Town cannot put this charge on the tax bill until after the service has been provided, so they need to fund the first year through a one-year levy increase.

The referendum questions reads: "Under state law, the increase in the levy of the Town of Decatur for the tax to be imposed for the next fiscal year, 2019, is limited to 0.727%, which results in a levy of \$281,741. Shall the back to the pre-referendum levy limit. Town of Decatur be allowed to exceed this limit and increase the levy for the next fiscal year, 2019, for the purpose of establishing a curbside garbage and recycling collection program in the Town of Decatur, by a total of 37.05%, which results in a levy of \$386,131?"

If this referendum passes, the town portion of the property tax will increase for one year to cover the cost of implementing curbside pick-up of garbage and recycling to all Town of Decatur residences.

The levy increase is for one year only and the following year reverts After that, the cost is a special charge on each tax bill with a residence.

The other referendum question reads, "Shall the person holding the office of Clerk/Treasurer in the Town of Decatur be appointed by the Town Board?"

This question is being put forward by the Town because the current Clerk/ Treasurer is retiring in April 2019 and the Board believes that appointing this position will better serve the Town by allowing the Town Board members greater leeway in finding a qualified person for the Town Clerk/Treasurer position. The Town Board is holding an informational meeting on Tuesday, Oct. 30 beginning at 7 p.m. to explain these referenda and to answer questions.

Representatives from Badgerland Disposal are on hand also to help explain their services. The Town Board encourages all residents to attend to hear all of the information and get questions answered.

- 5. Micrometer Measurement
- 6. Dial Gauge Measurement

These certifications are National post-secondary certifications that are NC3 accredited, industrial standard certifications. Fields that use the certifications include: Millwright, Machine Tool Operator, Precision Machining,

Green County 4-H Dairy Judging team wins National Contest

It was an exciting day for the Green County 4-H program, the community of Juda, and two local families especially. On Monday, Oct. 1, the Green County 4-H Dairy Judging team competed for the national title at the World Dairy Expo in Madison, and won.

It would be accurate to say that the pair of siblings - Clayton and Cole Mahlkuch, and Brian and Rachel Mc-Cullough - have grown up side-by-side. They've gone to school together, participated in 4-H and FFA together, been in many dairy show rings together, and judged dairy cattle together since they were little. Their family farms are even less than 5 miles apart.

The team's coach, Mike Marean of Albany, has known the Mahlkuch and McCullough families since he was a kid growing up in the Green County 4-H program himself, and he says the closeness the 4 of them have created is truly unique and special. "It is not every day you get the opportunity to work with kids that have the desire, drive and talent these kids have collectively shown," says Marean. "To have four

kids all from the same school, the same 4-H club and live less than 5 miles apart from each other win a prestigious contest is special for the Juda community. The national 4-H contest is the best of the best from around the United States. To compete and win on that stage, with the best talent from each state, is something special." Marean has been coaching the 4-H dairy judging team for the past 28 years, and was also a part of the dairy judging team when he was a young 4-H member.

This year's dairy judging team participated in weekly practices starting in April that led up to the regional competition at Area Animal Science Day in Darlington on June 29.

BRODHEAD PUBLIC WORKS RELEASE Leaf pick-up will start sometime after Oct. 15, depending on how soon leaves fall and amount raked out. Until then, you can haul leaves to the compost site.

Extended hours at the compost site starting Monday, Oct. 15 are Monday through Friday 1 to 5:30 p.m. and Saturdays from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Please follow these guidelines for

leaves you want picked up:

• Pick up is for leaves only. No garbage, animal waste, grass, brush, rocks or other foreign items mixed

in. Items other than leaves can plug and damage the equipment, which you can be liable for.

• Leaves must be raked to the edge of the curb or street in windrows away from trees, posts and other objects. If the machine can't reach your leaves, they will not be picked up.

Do not put leaves in the gutter or in the street. Leaves release phosphorus when they break down and decompose, representing one of the largest sources of urban phosphorus pollution. When left in the street gutters, a phosphorus-rich tea is produced that easily washes down the storm drains and directly into our rivers and lakes. You can help by raking leaves from the street curb in front of your home, and then composting them or placing them on the street terrace for pick up.

To ensure you leaves are picked up; please have all leaves out to the street as soon as possible. Leaves put out after Friday, Nov. 16 may be too late for pick up.


