## Town officials' last meeting offers teachable moment

A rumor raised and dispelled at the Town of Sylvester's annual meeting last week had few pupils present for its important lesson.

Fewer than a dozen of Sylvester's 641 registered voters turned out to witness a closing era in their rural community's politics. With less than half those registered voting two weeks previous (305 voted), it was the final meeting for two people who've served the board 18 years.

Town Chair Anna Anderson and Supervisor Terry Reed were stepping down after losing re-election in the rural area touching Juda, Monticello and Albany, a few miles west of Brodhead.

Distracting from what seemed an important moment in town life and public service, one person in the tiny audience raised a surprising issue. It concerned an accusation that Sylvester's town hall basement was under water, which sparked another person's outrage that this simply must not be tolerated.

A trip downstairs following the meeting, however, proved the basement, even the sump pump, completely dry. The town hall, indeed, sits above the intersection of County Highway FF and State Highway 59, with a commanding view of rich farmland all around, which pioneers cleared gradually from 1830s settlement forward.

Anderson did not let the unfounded charge last Tuesday spoil comments she'd prepared for her and Reed's successors. New chair Dan Moehn and new supervisor Mike Witt are stepping in to far more complicated and contentious issues many of Wisconsin's 1,255 townships are facing. Too much is at stake to let rumor cloud decision.

"Mike, you are very intelligent and well-educated," Anderson said to the new supervisor. "You are a successful businessman with a beautiful family. You have it all. You are bringing so much potential to the town board and township."

"My advice to you is to research everything before making decisions. Things are often not as they seem or as the most vocal people profess them to be. 'Might doesn't make right.' Don't be taken in by intimidation, scare tactics, misinformation and outright lies," Anderson said.

Remarkably gracious and pleasant, almost cheerful despite defeat, Anderson continued the same praise and encouragement to her replacement as chair. Moehn, like Witt, sat silently listening.

"Dan, I don't know a lot about you, but I understand you are a salesman," Anderson said to Moehn. "As such, you are most likely very good at establishing relationships. This will serve you well on the board. You bring good potential to the board and township."

"Just a word to the wise; your friends and neighbors will try to influence you and won't necessarily tell you the truth," she said. "You wouldn't be the successful man you are if you allowed people to use you like a puppet and not think things through to logical conclusions."

Anderson then urged the newly elected to work with remaining town supervisor Dave Schenk, who was unopposed and re-elected with 235 votes of 241 cast.

"I know Dave the best of the three of you," Anderson said. "He is calm, rational, and analytical. The three of you working together, combining your strengths, can make an unstoppable team. I sincerely wish each of you well. May you always hear the voice of the majority over the loud, squeaky wheel that represents the minority."

For Anderson, who worked two full-time jobs in Monroe most of the nine

times she served 2-year terms leading Sylvester's town board, life will surely now seem less complicated.

Reed, too, contributed time and talent in many ways to save the town money. Going out in pairs with others, for instance, Reed removed trees fallen across roads in storms to cut town costs of calling in county crews.

Town of Sylvester's board now faces tough decisions about how to resolve controversy swirling around many issues. They are issues affecting rural people everywhere in Green County and around Wisconsin.

Livestock waste handling, contracted fire protection, roads in disrepair, and expensive public services are just a

few. Related health and safety, ground and surface water protection, limited resources are at issue, too, for Sylvester's scattered population of not much more than 1,000 residents.

Questions are already being raised about special meetings to discuss and decide issues ahead of Sylvester's next regular monthly meeting in May.

With a thin requirement of only 24 hours' public notice and weak attendance in the town's annual meeting, it's uncertain whether Anderson's advice for research rather than rumor will guide lessons learned.

Only time and a new town board will tell before the 2020 annual meeting the third week of next April.



- Household Products**—Homeowners will be able to dispose of up to 50 pounds for free. Actual disposal costs may be charged for amounts over 50 pounds.
- A testing fee may be charged for unknown chemicals if amounts are greater than 5 gallons or 50 pounds.
- Participants with more than 50 pounds of household products or 200 pounds of agricultural products **MUST** pre-register by calling the Green County Landfill at 608-897-8605 **BEFORE** bringing their materials.
- All items should be properly identified.
- Proof of Green County residency is required.
- We reserve the right to reject any item that does not meet the intent of the program. Materials will only be accepted by authorized personnel during normal business hours from May 1 through October 31. Funding for this program is limited and the program will be suspended when the annual allocated funds are depleted.
- Businesses may dispose of hazardous materials for a fee through Veolia Environmental Services.

# County department positive balances noted in annual meeting

During Green County Board's annual meeting, Tuesday, April 16, the board transferred funds between the Undesignated General Fund and various accounts, or departments, to balance the budget in each department.

There was a net gain to the general fund, as more departments came in under budget or had more revenue than expected. This is done each year at the Organizational Meeting.

The Board also approved a list of non-lapsing funds for many of the departments.

Non-lapsing funds are funds that are kept within the allocated department for a specific reason, such as a study or project that is under way, or for a grant project.

If you are interested in seeing the list of departments and amounts transferred, details are posted to Green County's

website, [www.co.green.wi.gov](http://www.co.green.wi.gov).

County supervisors hold this annual board and organizational meeting each year on the third Tuesday of April.

The Board also passed Resolution 4-4-19 to "Authorize Passage of Existing Employer Update Resolution Relating to Continued Inclusion in the Wisconsin Public Employers Group Health Insurance Program".

In 2010 the Green County Board passed a resolution to abide by the state's terms for Wisconsin Public Employers Group Health Insurance Program.

WPE-GHIP has since updated its documents, and Green County needed to update, too, to be in compliance. Since passing this resolution, Green County's resolution is now accurate and in line with the state's.

A re-zoning in the Town of Cadiz was approved, changing a parcel of land from

agricultural to commercial; three annual reports were presented from the offices of the County Clerk, the Register of Deeds, and Land and Water Conservation. The County Board approved a fund transfer for the Green County Groundwater Quality Trend Data Project.

This project will be a 5-year endeavor with the option to extend. It will track specific data from the same wells over the course of the study, observing trends in groundwater with the expectation of determining what and how our groundwater is affected specifically.

It is expected this data will have the ability to over-lay with data from the previous Groundwater Study. This Groundwater Quality Trend Data Project is a direct result of the work and recommendations of the Livestock Facility Study Group. Green County is one of the first communities in the state to begin

tracking groundwater trends.

Because it is mid-year for the budget, approval by two-thirds of the Board had to be obtained for funding the study now, as opposed to writing it into next year's budget. The funding transfer passed with 26 votes for and 2 against.

Also a direct result from the recommendations of the Livestock Facility Study Group, are modifications to the Animal Manure Storage Ordinance and Animal Feedlot Ordinance, passed at the April County Board Meeting.

You can read the ordinance on the Green County website. The main changes included setbacks increased to maximum allowable, permit fees changed to a sliding scale based on size, definitions added, and wording changed to reflect current standards.

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# Spring Spruce Ups

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## Which home spruce ups are worth it and which are not?

 Come April, we're looking at the start of peak home buying season - the four months that generally account for more than 40 percent of annual housing transactions. The reasons are pretty obvious: The weather is (cross your fingers) nicer, the holidays are a distant memory, and families with kids prefer to relocate before the start of a new school year.  
 So if you're eager to sell - or just want to make some changes to test reactions - now's the time to save yourself some grief by learning which upgrades increase your house's value in potential buyers' eyes and which leave them stone cold.  
 And while you're at it, never forget the first rule of upgrades, according to Remodeling magazine's Cost vs. Value Report for 2019: "Think like a real-estate broker." Read on to see why that

includes focusing heavily on "curb appeal" and "first impressions."  
 • **Worth it:** a new garage door. It ranked first on the magazine's list of projects, with a 97.5 percent return on investment thanks in part to its relatively low cost. And for anyone who ever doubted that everything is pricier in New York City, that same high-tensile-strength steel door with windows costs \$426 more there than the national average of \$3,611.  
 • **Not worth it:** upscale bathroom remodeling. Want an easy way to save \$60,000 or so? Don't - repeat, don't - spend it on installing the whirlpool tub, heated towel bars, and stone countertops of your dreams.  
 Why? Because they're your dreams. And as Remodeling magazine notes, "Because of the vast differences in aesthetic tastes, one person's elegant new bath will be viewed by a range of other

prospective buyers as "tacky and outdated and in desperate need of a reset."  
 • **Worth it:** a bigger rug. Going bigger is actually a trick some real estate moguls have been known to use. Since the living room is likely the first interior part of the house buyers will see - and, remember, first impressions matter - bet on them extrapolating from it to guesstimate the entire size of the house.  
 Ergo, since the goal is to make the room seem more spacious ...  
 At least some buyers will judge the size of a room based on the size of the rug.  
 A nice Oriental one perhaps?  
 • **Not worth it:** a midrange backyard

patio. It's in the backyard, right? - emphasis on "back." Which explains why it only garnered a 55.2 percent return on investment.  
 • **Worth it:** a new roof. "Buyers pay a premium for one already in place," Credit.com has observed.  
 No kidding. In fact, given that it's such a prominent part of the house, you might call the roof the ultimate curb enhancer: If buyers like what they see, you're halfway home; if they don't, they may look for even more things to hate and certainly won't be quick to open their wallets.  
 Or, as Remodeling magazine says about curb appeal: "The impact these

impressions make is critical in setting the stage for what a buyer is willing to pay for a home."  
 If your roof needs replacing, check out the best-selling Timberline roofing shingle line from GAF (gaf.com), North America's largest roofing manufacturer. The shingles have the look of luxury at a very affordable price.  
 And remember: Don't be afraid to use a new roof as the "negotiating tool" with buyers that Credit.com says it is.  
 • **Not worth it:** a major upscale kitchen remodel. Another of those "differences in aesthetic tastes" issues. Better off to stick to repainting the walls or resurfacing cabinets, if need be.

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## Fix up your entryway: Making the most of a mudroom

Mudrooms - transition spaces between the outdoors and the indoors that provide storage for footwear, wet clothes, sports gear, and other paraphernalia not wanted in the house - have grown in popularity as American homes have become bigger.  
"While mudrooms are not a new amenity, they've moved up on the list of must-haves for today's homeowner," says Linda Jovanovich of

the American Hardwood Information Center, [www.hardwoodinfo.com](http://www.hardwoodinfo.com).  
"As the amount of residential square-footage dedicated to mudrooms has grown, so has the attention paid to their design and aesthetics. Solid hardwood built-ins not only provide the customization needed in what are sometimes awkwardly configured spaces, but also create the opportunity to bring the warmth and character of natural wood to what is

first and foremost a service room."  
Bob Near, renovation division director at Streeter & Associates, a Minneapolis-based home-building firm that installs myriad mudrooms, agrees: "For example, working with Peterssen/Keller Architecture and Eminent Interior Design, we recently completed a large mudroom with red-birch cabinetry, part of the makeover of a dated 1980s house. The client wanted a mid-century look, as if the room had been built in the 1960s, so its design is very clean." One wall is entirely floor-to-ceiling storage concealed behind plain slab doors; the other comprises a row of six locker-room-style open cubbies serviced by a single full-length bench.

"The client also asked for unstained wood rather than painted cabinetry, for reasons of durability and aesthetics," Near continues. "First, they felt a clear polyurethane varnish would hold up better than enamel paint to the wear and tear imposed by four active boys. And second, they wanted to give the somewhat austere space a more earthy, homey feel."  
Easily applied by hand, the oil-based satin finish had the added advantage of deepening the tone of the red birch without changing its color, an important consideration because the wood had been carefully selected for its not-too-pink, not-too-green hue.  
As a whole, the project could

serve as a terrific checklist of best mudroom practices: With six cubbies, there's one to assign to each member of the family, who'll then have an easily accessed set of hooks on which to hang wet weather gear; a stretch of solid bench on which to sit and take off dirty boots and shoes that can then be quickly stored in the deep cubbies underneath; a handy drawer for smaller items that might otherwise get lost; and all delivered in a beautiful, red-birch package. Find a better example of flawless function married to fabulous form if you can.

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# Rock River groups, agencies sponsor free stream monitor training

Jefferson County Land and Water Conservation Department (LWCD), Rock County Land Conservation Department, and Rock River Coalition (RRC) are recruiting volunteers to assess stream health in Jefferson County, Rock County and throughout the Rock River basin.

Volunteer stream monitors devote a few hours each month (from May to October) to collect information vital to understanding stream health.

Stream monitors provide valuable data that helps identify healthy stream segments and flags segments that may have water quality concerns.

This information will help target local efforts where they are most needed.

Two upcoming training events are scheduled:

Jefferson County LWCD and the Rock River Coalition are hosting

training Saturday, June 1 from 9 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. in Cambridge.

Rock County LWCD and Rock River Coalition are hosting training on Saturday, May 18 from 9:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. in Clinton.

Register today for this free volunteer training opportunity. The training will be a combination of in-class and hands-on. The latter is a "feet-in-the-water" look at streams and methods used to access what affects them.

Participants will learn to measure stream flow, temperature, water clarity and dissolved oxygen. They will also learn how to assess stream health by examining aquatic insects.

Equipment is provided for the training. Just bring a pencil and writing pad, lunch, drinking water, towel, and hip boots or waders (or wear

shoes that can be worn in the water).

## Fontana man killed in two-vehicle crash in Bradford Township

Rock and Walworth county sheriff's deputies responded last Tuesday early afternoon to a report of a two-vehicle crash on East U.S. Highway 11/14 at South County Highway C in Bradford Township.

Fire and EMS personnel from Clinton and Darien also responded, along with MD-1, a first response medical doctor from Mercy Hospital and Trauma Center in Janesville.

The investigation shows a 2007 Mercury Milan, driven by an 85-year-old male from Fontana, was traveling northbound on County C when he failed to stop for the stop sign at East Highway 11/14.

The Milan entered the intersection and was struck broad side (T-Bone) by an eastbound 2018 Chrysler Pacifica.

A 76-year-old male from Delavan was operating that vehicle.

The impact of the collision pushed both vehicles onto a vacant business lot to the northeast of the intersection.

The 85-year-old male was transported by ambulance to Mercy Hospital and Trauma Center, where he was pronounced deceased at 1510 hours.

The 76-year-old male and his 70-year-old wife were also transported to Mercy Hospital and Trauma Center. They were treated and released with minor injuries. All three individuals had been wearing seatbelts prior to the crash.

The Rock County Sheriff's Office Crash Reconstruction Unit responded to reconstruct the crash, which last week remained under investigation. Highway 11/14 remained open during the on-scene investigation. No citations or arrests are anticipated at this time.
