UW-Extension Master Gardeners earn certification

Twenty-seven Green County area residents were recently recognized for earning their Master Gardener Certification at the recent annual meeting of the Green County Master Gardeners Association. The main functions of the group are to serve the needs of all horticulturists in the Green County area, provide continuing education for its members, provide community services through volunteer activities, exchange gardening ideas, promote responsible and sound gardening practices and to provide a link between the community and University of Wisconsin-Division of Extension.

To earn the Extension Master Gardener Certification participants are required to complete 36 hours of classroom training. They must also complete at least 24 hours of community service before receiving their Extension Master Gardener Volunteer Certification. Recertification is required annually and to retain their certification, Master Gardeners must participate in a minimum of 10 hours of educational development in addition to providing 24 hours of volunteer service each year.

The Green County Master Gar-

deners Association was formed in 2004 to provide Master Gardeners with opportunities for professional development and community service. Over 135 people have been trained since that time. This past year members of the association volunteered a total of 1,578 hours in community service projects throughout Green County.

Three Master Gardener Volunteers were honored for achieving 150 hours of service: Rudy Kaderly, Cindy Palombi, and Wendy Pendergraph. Tamara Schulte was recognized for 250 hours of volunteer

service; Linda Boll, Theresa Colney, and Tanna McKeon were recognized for achieving 500 hours of volunteer service; and Paul Roemer and Gregg Smith were recognized for achieving 750 hours of volunteer service. Kristi Leonard and Jayne Butts were recognized for 10 years of service with the Green County Master Gardeners Association.

The Green County Master Gardeners Association meets on the fourth Thursday of the month from

February through October. Association officers for 2020 will include Tamara Schulte, President; Sharon Adams, Vice President; Linda Boll, Secretary; and Lynn Lokken as Treasurer.

The Broncos had the upper hand from the very beginning as they more than doubled up the Panthers in the first quarter, 19-8. With the early lead, the Broncos didn't look back. The Panthers were able to fight back in the second quarter, but the Broncos maintained their lead as they went into the halftime break with a 34-19 lead over Juda.

The Broncos best quarter of the night came in the third when they more than doubled up the Panthers output once again. Putting up sixteen points of their own, and holding Juda to just six, the Broncos expanded their lead to 50-25 as things went to the final quarter.

The fourth quarter was much of the same as they impressive Broncos' offense put up another sixteen points, only solidifying their already powerful advantage. Juda eventually fell to Orangeville by a final score of 64-35.

Garret Rodebaugh has carried his success from the football field right over to the basketball court. Rodebaugh led the team in scoring, as he often did on the field, with thirteen points. The Broncos had four players reach double digits as all of Carter Kleckler, Miche Behring, and Zach

Baker had ten points each. The big win pushed Orangeville's record to 2-0 on the season.

The Panthers, who began their season with a tight win over Abundant

Life-St. Ambrose, were led by Royce Brauer and Trent Anderson. The duo each had ten points as they combined for twenty of the Panthers' thirty-five total points.

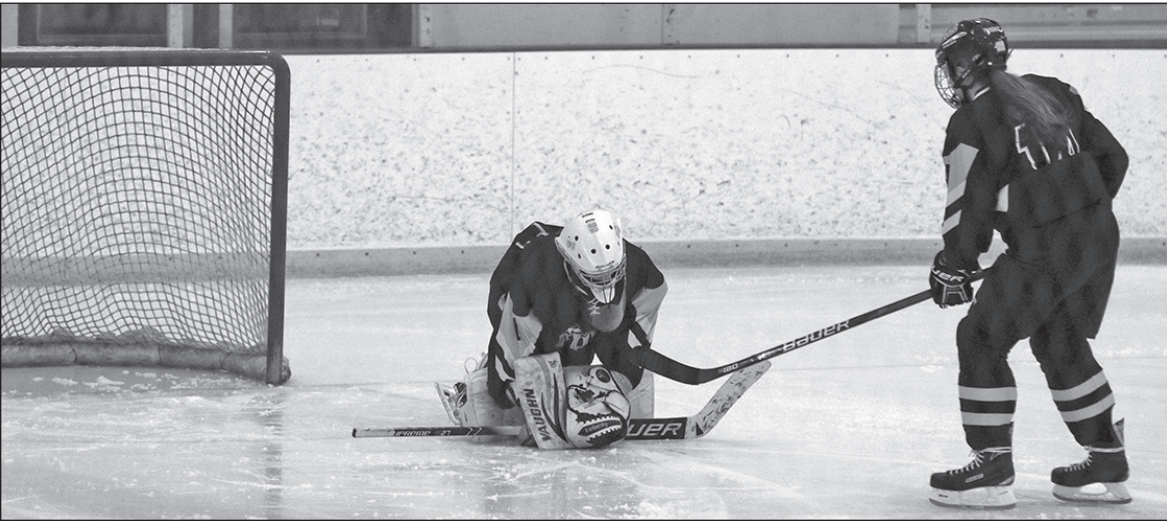

Monroe Clinic Volunteers in Partnership Scholarship applications are open

Monroe Clinic Volunteers in Partnership is once again offering two types of scholarships for students seeking a career in the healthcare field. The deadline for application submission is Feb. 28, 2020.

The first type of scholarship is for high school seniors. Monroe Clinic Volunteers in Partnership awards four \$500 scholarships to graduating high school seniors each year. Two scholarships will be awarded to Monroe High School seniors and two scholarships will be awarded to high school seniors from communities with Monroe Clinic branch sites – Albany, Blanchardville, Brodhead, New Glarus, Durand, Freeport and Lena – or who live within an

area serviced by a branch site or who have a parent that is employed by Monroe Clinic.

The second type of scholarship is for continued education students. Applications for five \$1,500 scholarships are available for Monroe Clinic's service area college students. Applicants must have completed at least one year of advanced study (beyond high school) in a health-related field and be a resident of a community with a Monroe Clinic location or a resident within Monroe Clinic's service area or an employee or child of a Monroe Clinic employee.

Requirements for both types of scholarships are the individual must be pursuing a degree or certificate in

a healthcare related field, have a GPA of 3.25 or higher with an emphasis on science and math, and all applications must be typed. In no specific order, recipients will be selected based on citizenship, need and school, and outside activities.

Students who have received a Monroe Clinic Volunteers in Partnership \$500 scholarship in the past are eligible to apply for the advance study scholarship. However, an individual may only receive each scholarship once.

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USDA establishes domestic hemp production program

U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Sonny Perdue announced the establishment of the U.S. Domestic Hemp Production Program. This program, as required by the 2018 Farm Bill, creates a consistent regulatory framework around hemp production throughout the United States.

“At USDA, we are always excited when there are new economic opportunities for our farmers, and we hope the ability to grow hemp will pave

the way for new products and markets,” said Secretary Perdue. “We have had teams operating with all hands-on-deck to develop a regulatory framework that meets Congressional intent while seeking to provide a fair, consistent, and science-based process for states, tribes, and individual producers who want to participate in this program.”

Background

Later this week, an interim final

rule formalizing the program will be published in the Federal Register that will allow hemp to be grown under federally-approved plans and make hemp producers eligible for a number of agricultural programs. The rule includes provisions for the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) to approve hemp production plans developed by states and Indian tribes including: requirements for maintaining information on the land where hemp is produced; testing the levels of delta-9 tetrahydrocannabinol; disposing of plants not meeting necessary requirements; and licensing requirements. It also establishes a federal plan for hemp producers in states or territories of Indian tribes that do not have their own approved hemp production plan.

The interim final rule becomes effective upon publication in the Federal Register. Following publication,

USDA invites public comment on the interim rule and the information collection burden. A preview of the rule is posted on USDA’s website.

USDA also developed guidelines for sampling and testing procedures that are being issued concurrently with this rule. These documents provide additional information for sampling agents and hemp testing laboratories.

More information about the provi-

sions of the interim final rule is available on the U.S. Domestic Hemp Production Program web page on the Agricultural Marketing Service (AMS) website.

Once state and tribal plans are in place, hemp producers will be eligible for a number of USDA programs, including insurance coverage through Whole-Farm Revenue Protection. For information on available programs, visit farmers.gov/hemp.

Fraud and identity theft protection efforts pay off

More than \$55 million in fraudulent and erroneous refunds and credits were blocked last tax season thanks in part to the Wisconsin Department of Revenue’s use of identity verification tools.

“Claim processing systems continue to improve, better detecting fraud, errors and discrepancies leading to bad refunds,” said Peter Barca, Wisconsin Department of Revenue Secretary. “Training and technology go hand-in-hand in our fight against fraud.”

“We carefully review filed tax returns to protect taxpayers, since cybercriminals and identity thieves continue to find new ways to commit fraud,” Secretary Barca said. “Our systems are very secure, but when criminals steal someone’s personal information from other sources, they may use it to file a fraudulent tax return, so we’re mindful of that.”

DOR is highlighting IRS National Tax Security Awareness Week noting that it is also a very busy online shopping week. Additionally, a new tax season kicks off next month.

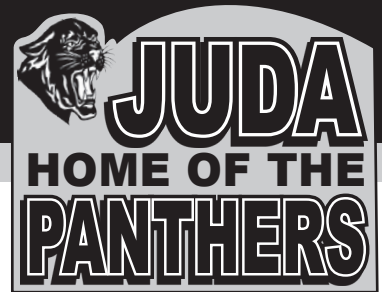
DOR wants shoppers to be cautious and protect themselves from cybercriminals looking to steal personal information that could help them file fraudulent tax returns.

A few highlights

Always use security software with firewall and anti-virus protections. Make sure the security software is always turned on and can automatically update. Encrypt sensitive files such as tax records you store on your computer. Use strong, unique passwords for each account.

Learn to recognize and avoid phishing emails, threatening calls and texts from thieves posing as legitimate organizations such as your bank, credit card company and even the IRS. Do not click on links or download attachments from unknown or suspicious emails.

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Quitting smoking can help prevent, manage diabetes

November is American Diabetes Month, an annual observance that brings attention to the disease affecting more than one in 10 Wisconsin adults (with one in three Wisconsin adults also at risk for developing type 2 diabetes). This year, the Southwest Alliance for Tobacco Prevention coalition want to remind the public that smoking is one of the leading risk

factors for type 2 diabetes, and that quitting can help lower your risk, or if you have diabetes, help you better manage the disease.

People who smoke are 30-40% more likely to develop type 2 diabetes than those that do not, according to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Additionally, people with diabetes who smoke

are more likely than nonsmokers to encounter difficulties with insulin dosing and managing their disease. According to Debbie Fischer/Southwest Alliance for Tobacco Prevention Director, "the good news is that quitting smoking can reduce your risk for type 2 diabetes, or if you already have type 2 diabetes, quitting can help you get better control over

your blood sugar, and help your insulin be more effective as quickly as eight weeks after quitting."

Free resources are available to help tobacco users quit. People who are ready to be tobacco free can call the Wisconsin Tobacco Quit Line at 1-800-QUIT NOW (784-8669). If they're on Medicaid, they can also talk to their doctor about the free support provided by the Medicaid Cessation benefit.

"Quitting is not easy, but worth it. Within 20 minutes after smoking your last cigarette, your body will begin a

series of changes that will continue for years", states Debbie Fischer.

Individuals can also reduce their risk of type 2 diabetes by regularly checking their blood pressure and cholesterol levels, being physically active, maintaining a healthy diet, and taking medicines as prescribed by their doctor.

DHS investigates outbreak of Adenovirus infections on college campuses

The Wisconsin Department of Health Services is investigating multiple cases of adenovirus (add-e-novirus) infection on college campuses around the state. Adenovirus infections most commonly cause respiratory illness, and while serious illness is rare, in some cases it can lead to pneumonia or death.

"Adenovirus infection is easily spread, which is why we tend to see it in places where large groups gather, like college dormitories and classrooms," said State Health Officer Jeanne Ayers. "While symptoms vary, the virus can be especially hard on people with weakened immune systems or who have lung or heart problems."

There are a number of ways someone can get adenovirus, including:

- Breathing in adenovirus from the air after someone with the infection has

sneezed or coughed.

- Touching or shaking hands with someone with the virus, then touching your hands to your mouth, nose, or eyes.

- Touching surfaces like a door knob, counter top, or phone with the virus on it, then touching your hands to mouth, nose, or eyes.

- Having contact with poop.
- Having contact with water that has the virus in it, such as in a swimming pool.

Symptoms of adenovirus infection depend on which type of the virus you have and the part of the body it is affecting.

Respiratory illness

These can range from cold and flu-like symptoms to bronchitis and pneumonia.

- Diarrhea.

- Pink eye.

In rare cases, inflammation of the bladder or severe neurological disease.

Antibiotics do not work on the virus. People with symptoms should see a doctor, stay home from work and school, and practice good health hygiene to avoid spreading adenovirus to others. People who have had the virus, but no longer have symptoms could still spread it, so it's important to be vigilant about washing hands and covering coughs and sneezes.

DHS is working with local health departments, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and college and university health services directors to provide prevention information and track the outbreaks. 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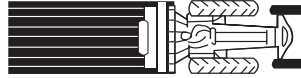
