The team members are: elementary school counselor Kate Hipenbecker; District's School Psychologist DeAnne Larson; Title 1 Math Teacher Anisti Haffelee; and Title 1 Reading Teacher Nikki Krumwiede.

Albrecht Elementary School has developed a new team this year called the Problem Solving Team. The team was developed to work with teaching staff members who may need additional ideas regarding how to meet the academic and/or social emotional needs of their students.

Kate Hipenbecker, our elementary school counselor; DeAnne Larson, our District's School Psychologist; Anisti Haffelee, our Title 1 Math Teacher; and Nikki Krumwiede, our Title 1 Reading Teacher meet every Tuesday morning with staff members in 30 minute increments and a

rotating substitute teacher covers the teacher's classroom during their meeting time.

The team will work with individual teachers to come up ideas to try and a timeline to reconvene and discuss the progress of the student during that intervention period.

'Right to Harm' film plays to large crowd

About 130 Farmers Union members and local residents packed Brix Cider in Mount Horeb for a Feb. 16 viewing of the documentary "Right to Harm". The event was hosted by the South Central and Iowa-Grant chapters of Wisconsin Farmers Union (WFU). The documentary, which is being shown by several WFU chapters in the coming months, shows the impact of factory farming on communities throughout the United States.

Right to Harm exposes the devastating public health impact that factory farming has on many disadvantaged citizens across the country. Filmed across the U.S., the documentary chronicles issues arising around industrial animal agriculture. The film features WFU members Mary Dougherty and Lynn Utesch, who share their experiences as champions of conservation and family farms. Also featured is economist John Ikerd, who abandoned industry beliefs after a 14-year career as a livestock marketing specialist. After the farm crisis of the 1980s he realized, "The farmers who were in the biggest trouble, were the ones doing the things we so-called experts were telling them to do."

"'Right to Harm' is both a moving and motivating film that shows the

power struggle between rural residents and money, the cost of environmental racism, and the importance of our water and land," said WFU Membership & Education Organizer Kirsten Slaughter. "A lot of the film revolves around power. Often power lies in the hands of the few who are causing the harm, but that can change when individuals in rural communities are able to come together to protect their communities."

"Clearly this is an issue that resonates with the community here in Southern WI," says Matt Sheaffer from the South Central chapter of the WFU. "A Dodgeville dairy farmer mentioned to me that he had been nervous about the tone of the movie but after seeing it was reassured that the real threat to rural communities and farms like his lies in the proliferation of large-scale industrial operations."

At the 2020 WFU State Convention in Rothschild, members of the grassroots family farm organization set Oversight of Large Livestock Facilities and Concentration in the Agriculture Industry as special orders of business.

"State standards under ATCP 51 regarding acceptance, regulation, and enforcement of CAFOs have failed to enable towns and counties to protect

their people, land, water, and health," said WFU Executive Director Julie Keown-Bomar. "Our members have shown a clear desire to educate other farmers and citizens around this issue and to restore local control to communities. We recognize that there are CAFOs that are family-scale farms, and they are not a target of this film. Instead it looks at the extremely large, industrial scale model that is sweeping the nation and threatening our natural resources, as well as the livelihood of the family farm."

"Right to Harm" is an enlightening exploration that questions whether citizens are entitled to clean air and water, while examining the political issues that stand in the way of nationwide reform. Additional viewings will be posted soon at www.wisconsinfarmersunion.com/events.

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Albany Village Board February meeting minutes

The regular meeting of the Albany Village Board was called to order Feb. 10, 2020 at 6:30 p.m. in the Albany Village Hall by President Kim Blumer. Members present were: Blumer, Bert Hefty, Michelle Monson, and Tonya Stephan. Absent were: Eileen Althaus, Fred Johnson, and Larry Nipple. Also present were: Lonnie Gill and Bob Ritter.

The Pledge of Allegiance was shared.

Proof of posting was verified. AGENDA: Motion by Monson, seconded by Stephan to approve the agenda as posted with the addition under item 14 of the Plans Meeting minutes. Carried.

MINUTES: Motion by Stephan, seconded by Hefty to approve the minutes of the January 13, 2020 meeting as printed. Carried.

PRESIDENT'S MOMENT: Nothing at this time.

PUBLIC APPEARANCES: None.

LIBRARY UPDATE: Nothing at this time.

DEPUTY CLERK/TREASURER TRAINING: Keepers explained that she would like to start having Michelle Brewer attend the Municipal Clerks and Treasurers Institute, as it is a 5 year process. This is a full

week training and is held in July of each year through the UWGB. Motion by Stephan, seconded by Monson to approve sending Brewer to the Clerks Institute at a cost of \$475 plus lodging. Carried.

POLICE TRAINING: Ritter explained that each of his officers require 24 hours of training per year. Officer Dennis expressed interest in attending a Field Training Officer training that is being held in Madison in March. This is a week training at a cost of \$425 but there will be no lodging costs. Motion by Stephan, seconded by Monson to approve Officer Dennis' training for FTO. Carried.

FENCE REPAIR AT BALL PARK: The backstop at the ball park is in dire need to be repaired before the season begins. In the end of March, high school baseball games will be held at our park, so this needs to be fixed as soon as possible. Motion by Monson, seconded by Stephan to have Sager Fencing Inc. of Monticello repair 40' of chain link fencing on the backstop at the Ball Park at a cost not to exceed \$1,200.00. Carried.

FOUR WHEELER TRAFFIC: Blumer reported that he has been contacted by some representatives from Brodhead who are gathering

together each of the municipalities along the Sugar River Bike Trail to see what can be done with the SRT to possibly allow ATV's on the trail and into the village. Blumer will set up a meeting this week so that we can see what the plans and thoughts are.

COMMITTEE AND COMMISSION REPORTS: The following committee and commission reports were acted on: Building, Grounds, Cemetery 1-14-20 Joint Recycling 1-20-20 Park Commission 1-20-20 Police, Fire 1-28-20 Street and Utility 2-3-20 Plans Commission 2-6-20

VILLAGE/TOWNSHIP GARBAGE COSTS: Much discussion was held on the Albany Township's request for not paying the full amount for the disposal of garbage. After much discussion, a motion was made by Stephan, seconded by Hefty to have the village pay 2/3 of the garbage only dumpsters (NOT recycling dumpsters) and the township paying 1/3 of the garbage only dumpsters for the rest of 2020. Before budgeting time, the board will need to decide on what to do in 2021. Carried. It was also reminded that all hours worked on recycling will now be charged to the joint recycling account.

SUMMER PARK PART TIME EMPLOYEES: Motion by Monson, seconded by Hefty to approve Cindy Mauerman as Summer Rec Director for 2020. Mauerman will find an assistant to work with her for the summer. Carried.

Motion by Stephan, seconded by Monson to approve Brady Deegan and John Thill for the summer of 2020 caretakers. Carried.

Motion by Stephan, seconded by Monson to approve Jeff Inabnit and Donald LaPointe will be cocommissioners for the summer of 2020. Carried.

FIRE DEPARTMENT OFFICERS: Motion by Stephan, seconded by Monson to approve the Albany Fire Department Officers: Dan Mueller, Chief; Justin Mueller, Assistant Chief; and Jacob Leonard, Treasurer. Carried.

OPERATOR'S LICENSES: Motion by Stephan, seconded by Monson to approve the following Operator's licenses: Elise Milas, William Sangermano, Emily Krause, and Tiffany Myers. Carried.

PHOSPHOROUS COMPLIANCE PLAN: Blumer explained the "Water Quality Trading Plan" that needs to be submitted to the DNR. Tim Astfalk has the appli-

cation ready to go, it just needs to have Blumer's signature on it. Motion by Monson, seconded by Hefty to approve the Phosphorus Plan as submitted. Carried.

SEVENTH STREET WATER MAIN: This is tabled at this time.

SUMMIT AND UNION STREET STORM SEWER: Motion by Blumer, seconded by Hefty to have the property on the corner of South Summit and Union Street surveyed and an easement drawn up before we do any work on it. Carried.

2020 EQUIPMENT RATES: Motion by Blumer, seconded by Monson to approve the 2020 equipment rates as presented. Carried.

TRAINING: Motion by Blumer, seconded by Stephan to have DeNure and Gill trade schooling dates, and have DeNure go to LaCrosse instead of Gill and to have Gill go to Plover instead of DeNure. Carried.

BILLS: Motion by Monson, seconded by Hefty to approve the bills as presented. Carried.

Plan ahead to avoid grandparent scams

Throughout the state, Wisconsin students and families are in search of sunshine and relaxation. But for relatives holding down the fort back home, spring break could bring an increased risk of grandparent scam attempts (also known as "family emergency scams").

The Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) asks spring break travelers to privately share their travel itineraries with their relatives and to develop a family plan for dealing with these threatening and frightening calls.

How the grandparent scam works: a fraudster calls a potential victim out of the blue and claims to be a relative (often a grandchild) that is in a bind and in immediate need of money. The scammers often claim that they are traveling abroad and were arrested or in an accident. They need money wired immediately (or need the numbers from a prepaid debit card) in order to get out of jail, to be discharged from a hospital, or to pay some other legal fees. The scammer asks the potential victim to keep the call a secret from law enforcement and from other relatives.

"Since the start of the year, DATCP has averaged at least one report each week from a Wisconsin consumer who was targeted in a grandparent scam," said Lara Sutherlin, administrator for the Division of Trade and

Consumer Protection. "Given the number of Wisconsinites traveling over spring break, we are concerned that scammers may see this as an opening to ramp up these threatening calls to family members back home."

The best way to combat these callers is to develop a family plan. This simple and important tool can help relatives detect the legitimacy of an emergency phone call and give them tools to check the status of the traveler. A family plan should consist of:

- A travel itinerary that includes contact information for accommodations or transportation services,
- A plan for regular, quick check-ins,
- A code word or phrase that would be expected in any true emergency call, and
- Open family communication to verify the safety of the family mem-

ber. If you receive a potentially fraudulent emergency phone call, DATCP offers these tips:

- Resist the pressure to act immediately.
- Do not wire money to strangers or provide your bank or credit card account numbers.
- Do not give out any personal information or confirm anything that is told to you.

If you cannot reach a family member and are unsure of what to do, call the Bureau of Consumer Protection (800-422-7128) or your local police on their non-emergency line.

Remember that this scam is not exclusively dependent upon the grandparent/grandchild relationship - scammers could also claim to be a different relative (a niece or nephew, for example) or a family friend.

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



ANATOMY

· Operations are getting better at the wwtp. There are still problems with the gas meters which keep failing. Director Todd is going to request replacements as they have been fixed three times.

· The sludge control is better. The pump is fixed. There were problems with two pumps that did not prime.

· A transfer was done to the drying bed.

· New chemical pumps will be installed in both wells in April. Martelle will be doing the replacement.

· The water tower needs to be inspected this year. Director Todd is not sure if it will be a dive inspection or if we will have to empty the tower.

· There is a major issue with the tractor. Discussion will be held further down the agenda.

· There are some problems with the box on the big plow truck. They were able to redistribute the load which helped. The truck has been completed serviced now. There are holes in the box, as it has never been emptied of salt. Brett Arnold will be able to fix the box this summer.

· Director Todd received a bid for crack sealing N. Main and Spring Street. Director Todd got the bid as it may be included with N. Maple Street repairs if that project moves forward.

· The new Kubota tractor mower comes on Friday. The equipment will work great for plowing sidewalks due to its size.

· The department needs to install the whiteboards at the Village Hall from

when the remodel was done.

· Director Todd received a price from Speich Electric to put a permanent 200 amp service in the shed behind the Village Hall.

· Director Todd explained that the parking lot at the Village Hall is badly disintegrating.

PURCHASE A WELDER FOR THE DEPARTMENT Director Todd explained that the department no longer has a welder which is needed. Motion by Tuffree, seconded by Schmidt to purchase a Miller Wire Feed MIG Welder for the department for \$2809.00, and also purchase the argon gas to operate it, and a spool of wire. Motion carried.

NEW TRACTOR BACKHOE FOR PUBLIC WORKS Director Todd explained that they found several problems when they serviced the Case Tractor. The tractor was put up on blocks and water was found in the fuel filter. When the front end was being jacked up, a wheel bent out and will not go back all the way. The front end had to be power washed to be able to get to what needed to be maintained. 11 of the certs were completely dry due to lack of maintenance. The tire rods and master cylinder are leaking. The planetary hub behind the wheel should not move but moves up and down which means the tire could fall off during use. When serviced, the bushing and bearings fell off and some broke. There are also problems with the transmission as well. Director Todd explained that this is the biggest piece of equipment in the department and is used all the time. Director Todd had two bids, one for Kubota M62TLB-LB and a bid for Case 580 Super N. Director Todd explained that the Case is a heavier tractor and that the Village has attachments for the Case that cannot be used with the Kubota, meaning attachments would also have to be purchased. Motion by Schmidt, seconded by Tuffree to recommend the Village Board purchase the Case 580 Super N at the cost of \$92,567.00 which includes a trade in for the old tractor, and the mechanical thumb attachment for \$3,500.00. Motion carried.



Five tax filing tips for 2020

When Form 1040 debuted in 1914, the filing instructions were one page long. Today, they run 108 pages, not counting instructions for the more than 50 related forms and schedules. There are now seven tax brackets and five filing statuses, and the only constant about the tax code is change. After enacting the most sweeping tax reform in three decades in December 2017, Congress pounced again in December 2019, extending (sometimes retroactively) and modifying a slew of tax breaks and revamping rules about retirement accounts.

Given all that, it's easy to feel over-

whelmed. Here are five tips to help reduce tax filing stress and to minimize the chance of future problems with the Internal Revenue Service.

Find Last minute deductions

If you're bummed out about writing a big check to the IRS, consider writing a check that benefits you—and your retirement—instead. While it's too late for employees to top up 2019 contributions to a 401(k), you might still be able to deduct 2019 contributions to an individual retirement account (IRA), a health savings account (HSA) or, if you're self-employed (or have side gig income), a SEP-IRA.

Watch for Form 1040 changes

The IRS eliminated Forms 1040EZ

and 1040A in 2019 but has introduced a new form in 2020: Form 1040-SR, U.S. Tax Return for Seniors. It's designed for older taxpayers with bigger print and increased attention to the additional standard deduction for those 65 or older.

Meanwhile, there were a few notable changes to Form 1040. Among them? A question about cryptocurrency. You'll see the new language at the top of Schedule 1. Don't skip this question; the IRS has made no secret of its belief that taxpayers are not properly reporting their crypto transactions.

Check for common mistakes

Before you mail your return—or hit send to e-file—double-check to make sure that you didn't make any of these common mistakes: math mistakes, Wrong or missing social security number, filing status errors, and form not signed.

Safeguard your financial data

Phishing scams and identity theft concerns remain atop the IRS' 2019 "Dirty Dozen" list of tax scams.

If you use tax or other software, make sure that it's secure and up to date, and don't transmit or enter financial information on websites that aren't secure (look for "https" in the web address).

Tweak tax payments for 2020

• If your refund was unexpectedly large, take steps now to ensure that you have more money in your pocket throughout the year—and don't provide Uncle Sam with an interest-free loan.

• Did you owe more than expected? Adjust withholding

He then taught physics and AP biology at Maine South High School in Park Ridge, Illinois for 25 years.

David began studying piano in grade school, then organ. Going to his first opera and classical concerts in Milwaukee with his mother and his friends began a lifelong love of classical music.

He also worked in the family business of Everson's Funeral Home, as organist and ambulance driver during his high school years.

At age 15, he started his church musical career at the Evangelical United Brethren Church in Brodhead. Over the years he studied organ, harpsichord, voice, liturgy and choral conducting at North Central College, University of Wisconsin -Madison and Superior, Cincinnati Conservatory and Chicago Music Conservatory. He enthusiastically attended numerous Episcopal Music Conferences at Evergreen, CO and Monteagle/Sewanee, TN. Presbyterian, Lutheran, United

Church of Christ, and Christ the Scientist were denominations where he held positions as music director or organist. An accomplished organist, he served as Music Director at Emmanuel Episcopal Church, LaGrange II for 25 years. He enjoyed working with two choirs there and playing one of the finer organs in the Chicago area. He was always proud to play with his talented violinist daughter, Ruthanne.

After retiring from teaching in 1994, his life took another direction as he attended Kendall College Culinary School in Evanston and embarked on a long time dream to become a chef. He returned to living Brodhead for a period of time, after his father died, then he took up residence in La Grange in the late '90's.

David had boundless energy. He was an avid runner and cyclist, especially enjoying the trails of his native Wisconsin (especially the Elroy-Sparta). He had a vast knowledge of trains, a passion for train travel and driving the back roads of Wisconsin. Road trips to visit his brother Doug & wife Jan in Rockton and sister Maggie in Utah were important to him, along with cooking and hosting holiday dinners for his family. He was a very devoted dad and loved being a grandfather, especially encouraging reading and science, with lots of cookie & German pancake baking sessions in LaGrange. He and Diane also taught cooking classes together.

David was known for being an intelligent, professional, yet humble musician, and a gifted teacher. His spontaneity, great smile, passion for life, and a generous heart were his trademarks. He held strong beliefs. And he was also known for telling great stories beginning with 'Ya know'...

Even as he was saddled with dementia, he had an indomitable spirit. He often transposed his newspaper readings to Anglican chant.

Diane, his wife and partner of 22 years, was grateful have made much of this journey by his side.

A memorial service was held at Emmanuel in LaGrange IL on Feb. 29.

Interment will be at a later date in the Brodhead Cemetery.

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



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
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
