## Garden club offers scholarship

The Brodhead Evening Garden Club is offering a \$250 scholarship to a local graduating senior. ## Cheese Days reset for fall 2022

Citing uncertainty, organizers of the Cheese Days festival announced last week that the popular Monroe gathering won't be held this year.

Cheese Days also was canceled in 2020 amid the pandemic.

"Various elements are critical to the success of the Cheese Days festival — corporate sponsorship, volunteerism, community support and participation by vendors," according to a news release. "As of today, there is no guarantee that all elements will be fully engaged. All are required to build the solid foundation necessary to put on an event of this size and scope. At this time, it is impossible to plan and coordinate without that foundation."

"Festival-goers anticipate a weekend full of family fun, Swiss entertainment, agricultural education, the big cheese tent, a giant parade, and the best deep-fried cheese curds," the release said. "A Cheese Days festival without all of those pieces firmly in place would not ring true to expectations by attendees or organizers."

Volunteers are welcome to join in now to help plan the next Cheese Days festival, set for Sept. 16 through Sept. 18, 2022.

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# State to issue meal benefits to children **Obituary**

## It's for families missing free, reduced lunches because of pandemic

Families across Wisconsin will get help feeding their children who usually get free or reduced price meals at school but haven't this school year because of the pandemic.

In the December stimulus package, Congress authorized the United States Department of Agriculture's Food and Nutrition Service to renew the Pandemic Electronic Benefits Transfer program, or P-EBT, for the 2020-2021 school year. Wisconsin's plan for providing benefits has been approved by FNS, and eligible families will begin seeing notifications and benefits in late March and early April. Benefits will be provided retroactively to the beginning of the school year. More than 350,000 families received P-EBT during the final months of the 2019-2020 school year.

"COVID-19 has disrupted Wisconsinites' lives, budgets, and educational plans for a full year now," said DHS Interim

Secretary Karen Timberlake. "The Pandemic EBT program will provide much-needed economic and nutritional support to families that need it the most."

Many families will be notified of their eligibility in late March and early April. Families will automatically receive a letter in the mail about their benefits if:

- They have a child who is already enrolled to receive free or reduced price meals at a school that participates in the National School Lunch Program; and,

- The child's school responded to a survey sent out by the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction and reported that students in the child's grade attended class from home full or part time during certain months of the 2020-2021 school year; and,

- The child's family currently receives benefits from another state program like BadgerCare Plus or FoodShare.

If eligible families have an active QUEST card, the benefits will be provided on that card; otherwise, families will receive a dedicated P-EBT card in the mail. This ATM-like card can be used in stores to purchase the same items allowed under FoodShare.

Benefits received in late March or early April will cover the months of August through November 2020 if a child met the P-EBT eligibility requirements during that time.

Families that do not receive benefits by early April, but believe they should have, will be able to fill out a simple application. A link will be posted on the P-EBT program webpage when available. This application will allow families to determine their eligibility and provide DHS with the information needed to calculate and send benefits to them. Families who have never received support before will first need to contact their school to

apply for free or reduced price meals. Families can also apply for FoodShare online.

The P-EBT webpage will be updated with information about this program on an ongoing basis. DHS is also setting up a dedicated call center that will answer P-EBT questions for families and schools and work to resolve issues, beginning in early April. The call center number will be published on the P-EBT webpage when available. In the meantime, people can submit general questions to PEBTSupport@wisconsin.gov. Direct answers will not be provided until the P-EBT support team is in place, but answers to the most frequently asked questions will be added to the FAQs on the P-EBT program webpage.

Wisconsin will also be submitting a plan to FNS for a similar program that will provide meal benefits for children 6 years or younger who are not in school.

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
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



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## Feds, state extend individual tax filing deadline

The Internal Revenue Service issued a news release last week indicating that the federal income tax filing and payment due date for individuals for the 2020 tax year will be automatically extended from April 15, 2021, to May 17, 2021.

As a result, the Wisconsin individual income tax return filing and payment due dates are extended to May 17, 2021, according to a state news release. Wisconsin law provides for an extension of time and waiver of interest and penalties when the IRS extends filing deadlines during a presidentially declared disaster.

"This has been a hard year for everyone. People are still trying to catch up financially and emotionally. Extending the tax deadline to May 17 should help make things a bit easier for those who need the extra time," Wisconsin Department of Revenue Secretary Peter Barca said in the release.

The state outlined some highlights of the extension:

- Individuals do not have to file any extension forms to be eligible for this new due date.
- No interest or penalties will accrue during the period of April 15, 2021, to May 17, 2021. Interest and late filing fees will apply beginning May 18, 2021.
- No underpayment interest will apply for failure to make quarterly estimated individual income tax payments for the 2020 tax year.

• This relief is solely for 2020 individual income tax returns and payments that are normally due April 15, 2021.

This relief does not apply to 2021 estimated tax payments for individuals, the first payment of which is due April 15, 2021, or to any other returns or tax payments due to the Department of Revenue.

"Roughly half of all taxpayers in Wisconsin have already filed their

tax returns, and most have received refunds, on average over \$800," Barca said. "We are still processing returns and issuing refunds and other credits that Wisconsinites rely on such as the Homestead Credit and Earned Income Tax Credit."



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# Virtual session highlights career as conservation warden

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources is recruiting for its next class of conservation wardens. Those who might be interested can learn more about the career at a virtual information session at 7 p.m. tonight, Wednesday, March 24.

DNR conservation wardens are credentialed law enforcement officers who work across the state enforcing natural resource and recreation safety laws, educating the public on conservation topics and providing law enforcement services on state park and forest properties and state trails. The application period will open in April.

In the virtual presentation, DNR Wardens Vong Xiong and Amanda Kretschmer will talk about a day in the life of a warden and the specialized knowledge needed to become a strong candidate in the recruiting process. The information session also will include a Q&A session.

Xiong became a DNR conservation warden in 2016.

"What we do now is going to set a precedence of expectations regarding how we conserve our natural resources for the future," Xiong said. "My best day as a warden is knowing I made a difference. Nothing lasts forever if you don't take care of it, and that's why I became a Wisconsin

conservation warden."

Warden Kretschmer, a native of Burlington, became a DNR conservation warden in 2016. She came to the warden service with a lifelong love of the outdoors and an appreciation of urban and rural communities.

"Wisconsin is a terrific state for outdoor recreational opportunities along with a variety of natural resources," Kretschmer said. "Every day, I look forward to working with different communities and doing the public service that this career is known for. Each day is different."

The department encourages anyone with a passion for helping people and protecting natural resources to apply.

"We want the conservation warden service to look like Wisconsin's population, and that means reflecting diversity," said DNR Training Director Capt. Cara Kamke. "We have an effective training program to help newly hired staff find success in this unique career, and we hire people from a wide variety of backgrounds."

DNR conservation wardens also work cooperatively with other law enforcement and public safety agencies at the local, state and federal level on law enforcement and emergency response initiatives. Conservation wardens also respond to natural disasters

and public safety emergencies.

## UW-Whitewater to host state budget public hearing on April 9

The Joint Committee on Finance recently announced the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater will host the first of three locations chosen for in-person public hearings on the next state budget.

"First, I want to thank the Joint Committee on Finance for choosing UW-Whitewater for one of these important meetings. It is such an honor to host a meeting in which committee members will seek feedback from people across Wisconsin on the priorities for next state budget. This is a critical part of the budget process," Chancellor Dwight C. Watson said. "This is also a great time for members of the legislature and the state to get to know more about our amazing university, and to see their financial support of UW-Whitewater at work. This is simply a wonderful opportunity for UW-Whitewater and our community."

The format will be similar to past hearings and attendees will be asked to fill out a form upon arrival to be added to the queue to testify. Those attending in-person will be required to wear a facial covering and practice social distancing as part of campus COVID-19 protocols.

The event, on Friday, April 9, will begin at 10 a.m. and conclude at 5 p.m. The location on campus will be announced in the coming days.

The other in-person hearings will take place in Rhinelander and Menomonie.

A virtual public hearing is also scheduled, and pre-registration will be required for the virtual hearing. 

## FFA alumni auction equips Juda students for success

The annual Juda FFA Alumni Auction is more than a chance to bid on everything from farm equipment to furniture to ducks. It's a way to invest in agricultural education.

The consignment auction is set for 9 a.m. Saturday, May 1, at the Juda School bus garage, N2370 County Highway S, Juda.

"It all goes back to the Juda FFA members," Juda FFA Alumni Treasurer Ralph Johnson said about the auction proceeds.

The auction typically draws 200 to 300 buyers from southern Wisconsin and northern Illinois who bid on farm equipment, household items, tools, knickknacks, livestock and more, Johnson said.

"We usually sell ducks and geese every

year, sometimes chickens," he said. "We get just about anything" to be sold at auction, he said.

This year's auction will be held outside the bus garage. Attendees will be asked to wear masks when within 6 feet of others, such as when obtaining an auction number or paying for auction purchases, Johnson said.

The auction dates back to at least the 1980s, he said, with 2020 being the only year in memory when it wasn't held.

The event usually raises \$5,000 to \$7,000 for the Juda FFA, which has about 90 members.

"The auction helps a lot with us being able to get things for the students," said Joseph Lyne, Juda FFA adviser and agriculture teacher.

Auction proceeds are used to fund scholarships, trips to FFA events and conventions, FFA jackets, equipment in the shop and more, Lyne said.

"A lot of the equipment we have in the shop, we have because of the FFA alumni," including saws and welding equipment, he said. "I know the kids are very appreciative of all that the alumni have done for them."

Auction proceeds also have been used to establish a greenhouse at the school and to fund curriculum for a leadership class that's open to all students, Johnson said.

"They (the FFA alumni) are a very supportive group of people," Lyne said.

# Extension lays out swine exhibition procedures for Green County Fair


Green County Fair swine exhibitors will be required to self-identify their pigs using the RFID tag method this year, according to an Extension Green County news release. Exhibitors will be required to tag their own pigs and do photo identification for each fair pig.

There will be no cost for the swine photo identification kits. Exhibitors also will be given two RFID ear tags for each animal at no cost.

Swine photo identification kits and ear tags will only be available for pickup at the Extension Green County Extension Office, 2841 Sixth St., Monroe. The items will be available for pickup starting March 30 and must be returned to the Extension Green County office by April 16. The kits cannot be mailed.

Photos of each pig must be taken from one head view, clearly displaying the RFID ear tag in the pig's ear. Photos must be attached to the Green County Fair swine photo identification form and submitted to the Extension office by 4:30 p.m. April 16.

The Extension Green County office will loan out ear taggers for exhibitors to use for tagging their pigs. The tag-

gers must be returned to the Extension office and will be sanitized before being given to another farm to prevent the spread of disease.

Each exhibitor can identify a maximum of five pigs. New this year, exhibitors will be allowed to bring a maximum of two total pigs.

Pigs must weigh at least 225 pounds by the fair to exhibit and at least 235 to sell in the Green County fair livestock auction.
