Ends returns to edit Independent Register

It's not as if we don't have enough to do. Honestly, we're like so many neighbors and friends here in Wisconsin and other places we've lived and worked.

We all wish life would slow down. We all wish life felt less out of control. We all wish we could see our children and grandkids more.

Yet these are the very reasons I still feel drawn to newspaper work. Life isn't slowing down for anyone. I see neighbors, small businesses, farming people, all levels of government, our schools, too, struggling. I want to help leave the world a better place for them, for my children and grandchildren.

More than a century before us, Leo Tolstoy said the purpose of all writing is to make the world a better place. A whole lot longer ago, Aristotle said if we want to persuade in writing, we must be a good friend, a good person, and show good sense.

This is what journalism and journalists have taught me since I was a child.

It's what I've tried to do in reporting and columns for The Independent-Register as a correspondent periodically for more than 14 years. It's what I tried to do when I edited the Register from October 2014 to March 2015:

- Conveying the significance of what elected and appointed officials are doing for their public;
- Informing the public for their health and safety;
- Contributing to communities in ways that sustain and secure what's vital; and
- Commemorating and honoring young and old, in life and death.

My instructors at Marquette University where I earned a master of arts in journalism in 1980 held me to these purposes and standards. Some fine editors at the Myrtle Beach, S.C., Sun News; the Asheville Citizen-Times; the Hendersonville, N.C., Times-News; and the Janesville Gazette, where I worked variously full time in the years thereafter did, too.

Life's full of surprises. Like the surprise ice and windstorms that ripped roofs off four greenhouses, cutting short my first time as the Independent Register's editor. I've juggled multiple jobs for years, but that challenge really set me back.

I hope to surprise you in more positive ways each week I edit and report again full time for The Independent-Register. I also believe as an honest friend, motivated to seek good and devoted to common sense, that we have a common purpose, a higher good.

I believe together with a newspaper in our lives we can help make the world a better place.

Pearl Island 'Bioblitz' calls volunteers to Headgates Park June 16

Scientists and nature enthusiasts will gather at Headgates Park on Decatur Lake north of Brodhead on Saturday, June 16.

Their common goal will be inventorying the life in the natural communities on Pearl Island and in the Sugar River.

This activity, known as a "Bioblitz," will attempt to identify and list as many organisms as possible within a 14-hour period. Participants will work from early morning when the birds start signing through later in the evening when bats emerge.

Other groups of organisms targeted for identification will include plants, insects, freshwater mussels, fish, and macro invertebrates. If conditions are right, the group will also scan the night skies for constellations and planets.

Nature lovers of all ages are welcome to participate in this educational outdoor experience, according to Susan Lehnhardt, of the Lower Sugar River Watershed.

Participants should dress for deep woods and wet places, and bring re-fillable water bottle, snacks, bug protection, binoculars, and identification guides, Lehnhardt stated in a Bioblitz press release.

Registration is free, and check-in will occur throughout the day in the shelter at Headgates Park. "A schedule will be posted there, so that participants can choose to join the experts conducting the various inventory activities planned throughout the day," Lehnhardt stated.

These include: Birds, 7 to 9:30

a.m.; Plants/Insects, 10 a.m. to noon; Fish/Macros/ Mussels, 2 to 4 p.m.; Bats, Night-flying Insects, and Stars, after dark.

Co-sponsors joining the Lower Sugar River Watershed Association for this event include Decatur Lake Mill Race Association, Green-Rock Audubon Society, Wisconsin Farmers Union South Central Chapter, and the City of Brodhead Pearl Island Committee.

Luther Valley group hosts June program on nuclear history

Dennis R. Hafemann will present a program titled "The Status of Nuclear Weapons Today" in Footville next Thursday, June 14.

The program will begin at 7:30 p.m. at The Luther Valley Historical Society Museum and Community Center, 215 Janesville St., Footville.

"Each year, as more previously secret information is declassified, we can paint a clearer picture of the Manhattan Project, which created the Atomic Bomb," according to a release on the presentation.

"We know who discovered the science underlying the bomb. We know the Army Engineer who organized a project that employed 600,000 people to make the bomb a reality. And we know who selected the targets and dropped the bombs on Japanese cities," the release stated.

"German cities escaped the same fate only because Germany had already surrendered. The current revival of the new Administration in Washington adds urgency to the story of the Cold War. This is a history of today that should interest us all," according to the Luther Valley release.

Letter to the Editor School board clerk speaks to issues surrounding meetings over building needs

Recently, the school board had architects review the conditions of the school and advise of a referendum budget of \$12,012,001, should we choose to complete everything on the list.

The Albany Board of Education has never planned on doing everything on that list, nor have we decided with certainty that we would go to referendum at all.

Our current priority is a secure entrance and fixing roofs that need repair. The school is busy with making grant application for the secure entrance to help offset some of the cost.

The community listening sessions previously held were to get feedback from those interested in the state of the Albany School buildings. Those sessions have been very helpful for the board, and I'd like to thank those who were able to participate.

I am proud of the Albany School, and I am excited to work with the current board members to upgrade curriculum and staff training to meet the needs of our students. We have had many successful students graduate from Albany and go on to become doctors, lawyers, nurses, skilled technicians, etc.

Of the recent 29 graduating seniors, 21 are headed to a post-secondary school. I think that speaks a lot about the kids in Albany, as well as the teaching staff.

If you're interested in attending our meetings, we have five regular board meetings for which the minutes are approved at each subsequent meeting, then published to the school website.

Any other meetings that are held are specific to committee and closed sessions. Those minutes are not published for privacy reasons.

I understand there was a misunderstanding recently by which the minutes were not published in a timely fashion. This issue has been addressed.

I encourage anyone reading this letter to make sure you understand the facts surrounding this topic. You are welcome to attend the open board meetings or reach out to members of the board to ask questions.

Organic dairy farm in Monroe hosts 'In Her Boots' workshop June 21 for women farmers

While the number of U.S. farms has been on the decline for decades, the number women own and operate is on the rise, according to the USDA Census of Agriculture.

Midwest Organic and Sustainable Education Service (MOSES) supports these women farmers with on-farm "In Her Boots" workshops.

The first workshop of the 2018 season is Thursday, June 21, at Wylymar Farms, an organic dairy that farmers Emily and Brandi Harris run near Monroe.

This day-long workshop aims to offer a blend of practical information, skill-building, resource connections and networking to encourage this growing segment of women farmers, entrepreneurs, and agricultural leaders.

This session will also cover ergonomics and machinery use for women; as farmer Emily Harris trained in Navy mechanic school and will share details about the tractors and other equipment she uses on her farm.

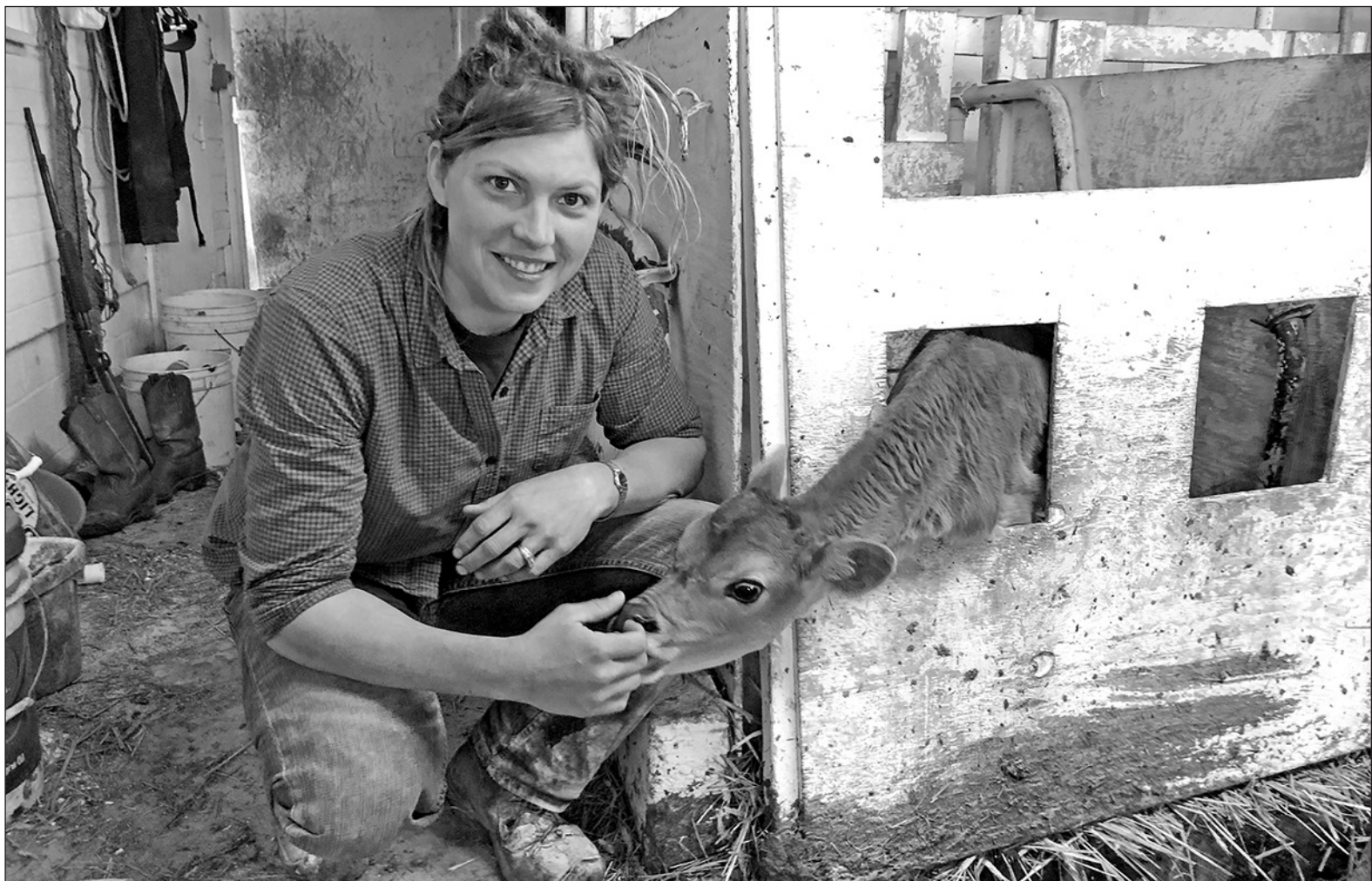
"We wanted to take this opportunity to share our farming story to help promote and support women in agriculture and educate on what's happening in the dairy industry," stated Harris in a MOSES release on the workshop.

Harris is a fourth-generation farmer, now running her own dairy operation since 2010 and certified organic. The Harrises milk 50 Jersey cows, care for 105 cows, and sell their milk to area cheese factories.

"Emily Harris is an inspiring example of this new movement of women farmers committed to collaboratively supporting each other," stated Cara Carper, head of the Green County Economic Development Corporation (GCDC).

"We're excited that this 'In Her Boots' session will be in Green County and will showcase this growing movement of women farmers creating new approaches to agriculture," Carper said, "and how these innovative entrepreneurs positively impact our local communities and are committed to keeping our region's agricultural heritage vibrant."

Workshop participants will learn about resources available to them from the GCDC, MOSES, Wisconsin Farmers Union, FairShare CSA Coalition,

and the National Farm Medicine Center.

The workshop will also cover a new opportunity for farmers to create additional income by selling non-hazardous baked goods made in home kitchens, now legal in Wisconsin thanks to a judge's ruling in October 2017.

The "In Her Boots" workshop runs from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. and includes lunch and a farm tour. Cost is \$25; space is limited and pre-registration required.

"In Her Boots workshops are based on the idea that women learn best from each other in a format where we can ask questions and mentor and inspire one another," explained Kivirist.

She and her family run Inn Serendipity Farm and Bed and Breakfast outside Monroe.

"Whether you're a seasoned female farmer or are just starting to bring your farm dream to life, this is a great opportunity to learn from and connect with other women who share a commitment to stewarding the land."

MOSES is a nonprofit organization that promotes organic and sustainable

agriculture by providing the education, resources, and practical advice farmers need to succeed.

The organization's flagship event, the MOSES Organic Farming Con-

ference, is the country's largest educational event on organic agriculture. It takes place every February in the Midwest. For more information, see mosesorganic.org.

Community garden keeps growing gifts learned from tending life in plants and soil

James Massen lovingly tends his vegetable plots in the community garden the same way he has for 8 years. Yet his roots in gardens reach

deep into his personal past with lessons on nurturing.

"My Dad had me planting a garden when I was 10 years old," Massen said in a pause from weeding this past weekend.

"I was a vegetable eater, too. I had to be told to eat the meat on my plate. I was kind of the opposite of most kids that way."

Massen has filled two plots in the garden again this year with quite a variety of vegetables. He's right next to the plots of his father Ron, who's still gardening in his 80s

James' cabbages, cauliflower, radishes, potatoes, onions, tomatoes, zucchini, broccoli and kohlrabi all show the care of his regular hoeing.

"I enjoy it," he said. "You can't beat the taste of a vegetable that's reached its maturity on the plant - not picked early and shipped."

Massen also enjoys introducing his fresh vegetables to friends who've never known the flavor and quality of vine- and plant-ripened produce, straight out of a garden.

Tiff Bates, who coordinates Brodhead Community Gardens, is very grateful Gassers Hardware continues to provide land behind its store on County Highway T, in the southeast corner of Brodhead.

"It's interesting to see every year that no one gardens the same way, yet everyone gets a good plot," Bates said.

United Church of Christ members across the highway from the gardens first started the gardens during the serious economic recession, which gripped the entire world 10 years ago.

They wanted to help people grow their own food, Bates said.

All ages, a couple of moms with kids, some people in their 80s rent

plots for \$10 in the community garden. The common denominator usually is that they don't have space at home to plant a garden.

June is late to be starting a garden from seed, and Bates issued a last call a week ago to anyone who might want to one of very few remaining plots.

He admits it's possible a per-

son could purchase bedding plants from one of the local nurseries or retailers along County Highway T to transplant into a plot.

Bates has begun to sow remaining space to a rye cover crop, though. It's another lesson learned from the charge that we "till it and keep it," the fertile soil of life's garden.
