With the grant and the pledge, approximately 40% of the project would be funded. It is necessary to raise \$400,000 by April 1, 2019 to

A referendum question will be on the April 2, 2019 ballot, asking voters to decide whether or not to move forward with the project.

Matching the grant and a positive referendum are both conditions of receiving the grant. The balance of the funds will need to be raised to have the project completed by October 2020, which is a grant requirement.

A fund raising campaign will begin shortly. Any and all assistance is needed and appreciated to accomplish these goals in a short

Rethinking school suspensions

School climate offers a clue

UNIVERSITY OF MISSOURI-COLUMBIA

A 2012 study by the Everyone Graduates Center at John Hopkins University found that when a high school freshman receives a single suspension, their chances of dropping out of school could increase by

Furthermore, only 49 percent of students with three or more suspensions graduate high school. That's nearly a flip of a coin on whether a student receives a diploma or not.

Now, researchers at the University of Missouri and the University of Virginia have found that when educators and administrators focus on creating a positive school climate, the likelihood of a student being suspended decreases by approximately 10 percent. To put this in context, more than 2.75 million K-12 students were suspended during the 2013 to 2014 school year. A 10 percent reduction would have meant 275,000 more students staying in class and

"A positive climate is one where educators and administrators create clear expectations for students, practice consistent discipline and display supportive behavior," said Francis Huang, associate professor in the MU College of Education. "This creates a positive school environment

is expected of them, they feel respected and supported, and they expect that they will be treated equally and fairly."

In addition to presenting clear rules to students and enforcing them consistently throughout the school, Huang said a positive school climate features an environment marked by supportive student-teacher relation-

Huang and co-author Dewey Cornell, a professor of education at the University of Virginia, analyzed school climate survey responses from more than 75,000 students from 310 middle schools in the state of Virginia to determine the relationship between student behaviors, the likelihood of suspensions and overall school climate. They found that while behaviors like fighting and bullying were the most powerful predictors of receiving a suspension, a positive school climate was associated with a reduction in a student's likelihood of receiving a suspension, no matter their race, economic status or behavior in school.

'Research shows that overwhelmingly, the students who are most at risk of receiving a suspension are either male, non-white, of low socioeconomic status, have a disability

for students because they know what or a combination of these characteristics," Huang said. "This study suggests that a positive school climate can be helpful for all students, regardless of their background."

through several growth stages. After hatching from eggs, "crawlers" begin feeding on the underside of needles and secrete a cover around themselves as they grow, creating the "scale" that is visible. The crawlers may establish new infestations. Wind and birds may also disperse infestations to new trees. EHS is very hard to control with pesticides, because it has overlapping generations with crawlers present all year long, and because the insects are protected by their hard, waxy coverings. EHS feeds on more than 40 conifer species, with hemlock, spruces and firs being among the most susceptible. Need to know facts

Elongate hemlock scale (Fiorinia externa), or EHS, is an invasive pest introduced into the United States from Asia. It feeds on a wide variety of conifers besides hemlock, including fir and spruce. It damages trees by feeding on the undersides of their needles, sapping nutrients from the trees and weakening them. This makes them susceptible to other pests and diseases.

To date, EHS has not been found in Wisconsin's forests or Christmas tree fields. However, Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection inspectors have found it on cut Fraser and balsam fir Christmas trees and boughs, in wreaths and other evergreen decorations, and on hemlock nursery stock. All these items came from suppliers in states where it has already been established. In spring 2018, inspectors found infestations on hemlock nursery stock from Pennsylvania in two separate instances this spring. Later in the year, it was detected in wreaths, swags, boughs, and arrangements of evergreens in containers at several large chain stores. All had received their stock from four suppliers in North Carolina. Inspectors also intercepted infested boughs from Virginia at one outlet before they had entered the retail market.

The Risk in Wisconsin

Wisconsin is a major Christmas tree state. Christmas trees are an important product in state and for export, and choose-and-cut farms are important to the agro-tourism industry. EHS feeds on eastern hemlock, as well as fir and spruce, which are among the most valuable Christmas trees. EHS produces 1-2 generations a year, and each generation feeds during multiple life stages, unlike many other insect pests. The insects wrap themselves in a hard, waxy coating, which creates the distinctive "scale" visible on needles. Because of these characteristics, EHS is difficult and expensive to treat with pesticides.

In addition to the threat to Christmas tree fields, EHS also poses a risk to our native hemlock forests and other coniferous forests, as well as to ornamental evergreens in parks and yards.
