Based on the 1929 design, the donor built this red-andblack biplane in 1996; over the years, he flew it to countless midwestern fly-ins, where it won numerous awards.

Transferable associate degree programs in the works for BTC



The Wisconsin Department Pierce, Richland, St. Croix, highly discouraged, especialof Natural Resources (DNR) is asking the public to stay vigilant and avoid burning because of very high fire danger across Wisconsin, particularly in the western half of the state.

The increased fire danger is due to a high pressure weather system, lack of significant rain and dry vegetation, primarily in the southern twothirds of Wisconsin.

Areas with "very high" danger include Adams, Buffalo, Chippewa, Clark, Columbia, Crawford, Dane, Dunn, Eau Claire, Grant, Green, Green Lake, Iowa, Jackson, Juneau, La Crosse, Lafayette, Marquette, Monroe, Pepin,

All DNR issued annual and special burning permits for debris piles, burn barrels and prescribed burns are suspended in these counties where the DNR has burning permit au-

As of April 12, the DNR has responded to 107 wildfires burning more than 276 acres so far this year. Nineteen of those were reported April 11, burning 120 acres. Most of these were related to debris burning.




