200 students join in FFA land, soil contest

Nearly 200 students from 27 Wisconsin high schools competed in the Wisconsin FFA State Soil and Land Evaluation Competition on Tuesday, Oct. 10, at Blackhawk Technical College's Monroe Campus in partnership with the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Natural Resources Conservation Service. Pheasant season now open in Wisconsin

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) reminds hunters that the state's 2023 pheasant season already opened this October and will run through Sunday, Jan. 7, 2024.

Pheasant hunters need a valid small game license and a 2023 Pheasant Stamp, which can be purchased through the Go Wild website or at a license sales location.

The daily bag limit is two roosters per day. This limit will remain in place for the remainder of the season. Hunters may harvest a rooster or hen when hunting in designated hen and rooster hunting areas; see page 18 of the hunting regulations for a list of these areas.

Several pheasant hunting properties close at noon on weekdays from now through Nov. 3. Hunters are encouraged to double-check the legal shooting hours on the properties they intend to hunt and consult the DNR's hunting rules and regulations before going out.

The DNR plans to stock approximately 75,000 pheasants from the state game farm on over 80 properties statewide. Depending on production levels, pheasants are released

once before the pheasant hunting season and twice a weeks of the season. After that, birds are released about once a week until the nineday gun deer season opens on Nov. 18.






