## Benefit draws 300 people in support of VetsRoll trip to Washington, D.C.

members of Orfordville's American Legion Post 209 passed another benefit milestone last week in the 15th year of the VetsRoll trip.

A record \$89,600 raised last Saturday evening, Feb. 10, pushed the Orfordville benefit total above \$500,000 raised since VetsRoll launched its mission in 2010. This was the 13th time the Wells-Davis-Young-Neal Legion Post in Orfordville hosted a benefit for VetsRoll.

The funds help sponsor a trip for military veterans to help them achieve closure, experience gratitude, and feel respect for sacrifices they made in national service, according to the VetsRoll.org website mission.

VetsRoll achieves this by underwriting trip expenses for 200 to 220 veterans and "Rosie the Riverters" to view Washington, D.C. monuments to those who served in the nation's foreign war efforts.

The annual trip held in May sends a 10-bus motorcade - 56-passenger, deluxe motor coaches from Badger Coaches of Madison – plus a media motor coach, and a support van with a wheelchair lift to the Capitol. The total entourage of 400 people in the caravan includes trip assistants, who pay their way, plus support staff, media, and drivers.

"I love the people of Orfordville," said Samantha Freitag, lead local VetsRoll benefit organizer, in a phone

interview Sunday. "They really turn out to support our veterans each year. So many people volunteer to help make this possible.

"We didn't have to buy anything; different organizations and a lot of individuals donated to this benefit, which the Legion graciously hosts," Freitag said.

This year's VetsRoll proceeds in Orfordville exceeded last year's record-setting \$70,640 raised, a 25% increase. More than 300 people came out to support VetsRoll last Saturday night. "It was a successful evening, for sure. Our record-setting evening included dozens of donations," Freitag said. "Notably, an anonymous donor gave a private jet flight to a Green Bay Packers game and eight regular season tickets, including limo service. After seeing the success of the evening, he donated the same donation for a second group, bringing the total contributed to \$24,000." VetsRoll welcomes veterans (active duty by Dec. 31, 1966; stateside or deployed overseas and honorably discharged with DD214 certificate) to join the WWII veterans and the "Rosie-the-Riveters" as

VetsRoll trip participants. "The meat raffle sponsored by 'Friends of Ben Neal' brought in more than \$12,000 for the night," Freitag said. Their volunteers handled everything connected with that portion of the benefit. They really do a great

Wisconsin near Evansville on Thursday, Feb. 8. It was the first ever tornado recorded for the state in the month of February.

The National Weather Service confirmed that a tornado was spotted just between Evansville and Edgerton. It was an EF-2, a tornado described as "significant," with winds between 111 and 135 mph. This tornado took place from approximately 5:45 p.m. Thursday until 6:15 p.m. The tornado is estimated to have been on the ground for about 30 minutes, covering about 25 miles.

After the tornado touched down in Rock County near Evansville, it tracked northwest of Edgerton and dissipated in southwest Jefferson County, just west of Fort Atkinson.

Just before the Evansville tornado, an EF-1 tornado, with winds less than 110 mph, hit closer to Juda and Albany. This tornado was confirmed to have taken place just before 5:15 p.m. on Thursday evening. It was on the ground for approximately 9 miles over 14 minutes. Damage was reported to a number of struc-

of a storm system that blasted across southern Wisconsin and other parts of the Midwest that brought strong winds, as well as lightning and even hail. Two other tornadoes were reported in Illinois.

At approximately 5:50 p.m. on Feb. 8, the Rock County Sheriff's Office along with the Evansville Fire District, Evansville EMS, Evansville Police Department, Brooklyn Fire District, Beloit Fire Department, Beloit Police Department, Janesville Police Department, Janesville Fire Department, Footville Fire Department, Fitchburg Department, Stough-Fire ton Fire Department, Albany Fire Department, Verona Fire Department, Turtle Fire Department, Town of Beloit Fire Department, Brodhead Fire Department, Wisconsin DNR, Wisconsin State Patrol, Rock County Department of Public Works, Rock County Communications Center, SWEPT, American Red Cross, Mercy MD, and Rock County Emergency Management responded to reports of severe weather damage east and northeast

As units began arriving in These tornadoes were part the area, they verified damage ranging from minor to major to several structures and outbuildings and encountered debris closing area roadways. Damage to power infrastructure caused outages spanning from west of Edgerton to Footville. Minor injuries were

reported due to the storm. With the power outages in the area, a warming shelter was established at the Evansville Fire Station.

The following roads were closed due to the tornado on Thursday: West HWY 14 from County M to County HWY H, County M from Territorial Rd to County HWY H, West HWY 59 from Tolles Rd to County HWY H, North Tolles from HWY 59 to HWY 14, North Wilde from HWY 59 to HWY 14, North Riley from HWY 59 to HWY 14.

At 8:57 p.m. on Feb. 8, Rock County Administrator Josh Smith declared an emergency for this event. Preliminary reports at the time indicated damage at several locations in and around Evansville.

All reported injuries were minor.

## Sanders running for district attorney

Jason Sanders, a prosecutor in the Rock County District Attorney's Office, announced his candidacy for Rock County District Attorney in the November 2024 election. His current boss, long-term incumbent David O'Leary, simultaneously announced that he is not seeking reelection, and is endorsing Sanders for the office.

Sanders has a decade of experience in criminal trial work, as both a prosecutor and defense attorney, and currently prosecutes a wide variety of crimes, including homicide and drug offenses.

"Our neighbors deserve safer streets, which can only happen through vigorous prosecution of violent, dangerous offenses," said Sanders. "And our young people deserve a chance to correct themselves before they become lifelong criminals. If the people

aggressive prosecution of the violent and the dangerous, while embracing commonsense programs to help lowrisk people turn their lives around.'

O'Leary stated that it has been a privilege to serve as Rock County District Attorney for 28 years, and wants to thank his family and friends who have supported him over those years. O'Leary is proud of the work his office has done in protecting the community and giving a voice to the victims of crime. O'Leary added that he is confident that Sanders has the experience

and ability to continue to lead the DA's office in the future. Sanders' campaign

website, jasonsanders. org, lists several dozen endorsements for the position, including most of the current Rock County prosecutors, as well as many other local attorneys.

Sanders is a 2014 graduate of the University of Wisconsin Law School, and was a teacher who coached football and basketball before deciding to go to law school. Sanders, his wife, and their children are Janesville residents. He is also the current Vice President of the Rock County Bar Association, and an enrolled member of the Bad River Band of Lake Superior Ojibwe (Chippewa). District Attorney is a partisan election, and like O'Leary, Sanders is running as a Democrat in the general election on Nov. 5

Janesville man found guilty at plea hearing

The Rock County District Attorney's Office announced that Christopher M.D. Senecal, age 26, was found guilty at a plea hearing held on Oct. 26, 2023, of five counts of Possession of Child Pornography. Evidence presented showed that Senecal possessed, viewed and disseminated thousands of images of Child Pornography.

believes that the case highlights how, with the help of community members and law enforcement, the criminal justice system can address the issue of sexual assault of children in our society. Assistant District Attorney Alex Goulart prosecuted the case for the State of Wisconsin.

Sustainable practices such as planting cover crops and using no-till techniques are growing in popularity as farmers discover their benefits, said Jeff Gaska, who has a 35-head cow/calf herd operation that is growing corn, soybean, wheat and rotational grazing on 450 acres in southwest Dodge County.

Using cover crops – smaller plants, such as rye, clover and other groundcovers that are planted alongside a main crop, such as corn - improves soil health by adding more organic matter and improving water

> "That lowers the feed cost and we don't need to worry about the manure hauling since they are out in the fields, adding nitrogen to the soil," he said. "It's also better for the animals to graze."

Gaska takes a holistic approach in evaluating the success of his farming techniques. He said if he plants more grass instead of corn, allowing the livestock to graze more and add weight, it is worth it.

"I look at everything as a whole. If I am down on the corn yield but saved money on seed and got a larger calf, I will take it," he said.

At his farm in southwest Wisconsin, Mike Berget uses the no-till method on 95% of his 10.300 total acres. He has used no-till methods since 2010 and has no plans to ever go back.

"I combine the no-tilling with planting cover crops and I've seen my yields increase,' said Berget, a director of the Lafayette County Ag Stewardship Association, a farmer-led nonprofit that shares and promotes conservation practices. 'We have also saved costs with fuel and labor by using no-till methods.'

Some of Berget's land includes river bottoms and he needs to use traditional planting methods there due to the soil make-up. He works closely with the local Universities of Wisconsin Extension agent to find answers as questions come

"He also has some good suggestions about different varieties of cover crops to try, for example. I never thought of oats

All Evansville Community School District schools were closed Friday "due to the storms and loss of power," according to a Friday morning Facebook post from the schools.

As of the morning of Saturday, Feb. 10, all roads, except Gibbs Lake Road, had reopened. Local authorities scaled down the Command Post established after the Evansville tornado. Law enforcement maintained an increased presence in the affected area.

For property access and other non-life-threatening law enforcement needs, residents in the affected area should call the Rock County Communications Center non-emergency line: 608-757-2244. Residents should continue to dial 211 for damage reports and unmet resource needs.

On Saturday, Rock County Emergency Management arranged for porta potties and pallets of bottled water at Porter Town Hall at 8809 N. Wilder Road in Evansville, and Yahara Valley Elementary

School at 8643 N. Raymond Road in Edgerton for residents and volunteers involved in cleaning up after the Evansville tornado.

On Sunday, Feb. 11, at 12:45 p.m., local authorities received notification from electrical companies working in the affected area that Gibbs Lake Road would reopen sometime during that afternoon.

Over the next week after the tornado, residents should expect intermittent power outages on Highway 59, Caledonia Road, and Gibbs Lake Road as electrical companies conduct repairs in the area.

The Rock County Sheriff's Office has received information about kayakers on the Yahara River and Badfish Creek. They have not had an opportunity to survey these waterways for debris and hazards. They strongly advise against paddling the Yahara River and Badfish Creek at this time.

is a considerable waiting list, so veterans who are ages 85 and older as of May 15 will bypass the waitlist. Ages 84 or younger will go on the waitlist in the order their information is received.

The cost to send a veteran on a VetsRoll journey is about \$850. Thus, the benefit held in Orfordville is essential.

World War II, Korean War, and Vietnam era veterans, with "Rosies" who have taken this journey, now number 2,470 and have come from 38 states. Trip expenses VetsRoll benefits defray include 7,690 hotel rooms, 58,200 meals, and 337,000 miles veteran participants have traveled.

Veterans and "Rosies" who helped war efforts have come in greatest numbers from Rockford, Ill.; Janesville, and Beloit to participate in Vets-Roll journeys.

Cy was born in Litchfield, Minn., and was a WWII Navy veteran in the South Pacific Philippine War Theater. Barbara is a lifetime resident of Beloit and worked as an Army Signal Corps civilian office employee as a de-coder for the War Department in Arlington, Va. She later worked as a wiring cable lacer at Jorgensen Engineering in Beloit until the end of the war. Barbara was treated as a "Rosie-the-Riveter" (the mostly women who went into the work force during WWII to allow more men to head indirectly leading to the Allied victory).
