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
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

On Tuesday, Jan. 30, the Albany Comets boys' basketball team began a new week of play with a record of 9-8. That evening, the Comets were set to face off with a struggling Juda Panthers squad in a Six Rivers-East Conference matchup. Juda was 0-16 prior to the game, and Albany would ensure the zero remained in their win

Juda managed to keep the game close in the first half. They stifled Albany's dynamic offense as they held the Comets to just twenty-three points. Juda put up just seventeen on their own end, howev-

After a close first half, the Comets blew the game wide open in the second half. Albany nearly doubled their production from the first half as they rattled off forty points. Ty Durtschi was electric on the night, hitting four threepointers and putting up twenty-one points.

That's one area the Comets

After a couple of days off, the Comets returned to play when they traveled to take on Cassville in the Six Rivers Crossover. Cassville has mostly struggled this season, with them bringing a record of 5-13 into their matchup with

Despite being the underdogs on paper, Cassville managed to upset the Comets managed to use to their ad- in a game that saw Albany's

offense struggle. Although Albany has multiple options on offense, this appears to be the recipe to beating them. In seven of Albany's nine losses this season, they have scored less than thirty-six points. Only once have the Comets won when scoring less than thirty-six, and that came in a

brose in December. Albany put up just fourteen points in the first half against Cassville. The second half was much of the same with the Comets putting up sixteen. Durtschi led the team in scoring with just eight points. Bakken added six and Smith had five as the Comets lost by a score of 45-30.

By the end of the week, Albany held an overall record of 10-9. They sit in the lower half of the Six Rivers-East standings at 3-6 in league play. With just a handful of games left in the regular season, the Comets will look to ramp things up as they prepare for the postseason. On Thursday, Feb. 8, Albany is set to play host to Black Hawk at 7 p.m.

"The No. 1 thing is having the right approach and right attitude. My job was to play baseball and I was fortunate that multiple coaches felt I was worthy to be in the lineup game after game," he said. 'Just get out there and do what you need to do."

Ripken did more than show up for 2,130 straight games. He won the Rookie of the

Year award in 1981 and led the Baltimore Orioles during a World Series championship season in 1983. Ripken also received the American

Ripken said his strong will to succeed also fueled his career. He credited his mom for teaching him how to channel negative energy into some-



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

Ripken said being consistent in the small things will make you valuable to your team.

"You can't always hit the homerun or make the winning catch, but it is what you do in-between that matters. There's value in your daily contributions," he said. "Having a strong conviction is also important. Stand up for what you believe in."

During his long career, Ripken learned the importance of controlling what you can and can't. "People said I didn't have to change much – I had the same team, the same spot on the field ... but I had nine managers during my career.

When it came to the media – something many players struggle with - Ripken went out to talk to reporters even if he did not feel like it. "I wanted to make sure my words were what was out there and not let the media or other people tell

my story," he said. A life-long milk drinker, Ripken recalled his first marketing deal was with the Mid-Atlantic Milk Marketing

"It was a radio ad. I always drank milk and felt it was a good fit," said Ripken, who continued to promote dairy throughout his career including a national campaign with a "milk mustache" on his face. "It's great being in a room full of dairy farmers.

This year's Dairy Strong conference brought more than 400 attendees, representing over 280,000 cows, and industry professionals to the KI Convention Center.
