New artists-in-residence coming to Shake Rag Alley

Shake Rag Alley Center has been an active member for the Arts is pleased to announce the 2025 lineup of artists-in-residence selected for the Scherbarth Residency Program: writer, mixed media, and movement artist Penelope Cake; Madison-based painter and creative Katie Hogan; and community-taught mixed media artist Meghan Rosing. Throughout February and March, these artists will be visiting Mineral Point to continue their practice and engage with the community.

The two-week Scherbarth Residency is competitively awarded to artists and makers in the visual, performing, and literary arts who seek to share their work in a public forum and contribute stewardship hours to the Shake Rag Alley campus while working on a project. Shake Rag Alley provides lodging, studio space, and opportunities to connect with Shake Rag Alley's creative community.

In late February, Penelope Cake will be visiting from Cape May, New Jersey to continue work on her book in progress The Library Project. With a BA in dance from Bennington College, and graduate course work at Bank St. School of Education, NYC, she continues to follow her creative impulses in everything she does and believes wholeheartedly in inspiring a creative life for others. While in residence, she will be offering a public program through the Mineral Point Public Library. Cake inhabits the library, observing its character, and paying close attention to her experiences. In her writing, she tries to capture the authenticity of the place and people

of the Atwood Atelier School and Studio for the past five years, and currently works as the Gallery Manager at the Art Hub in Cambridge, Wis., a community-focused gallery and art education space. Hogan plans to paint and draw the people of Mineral Point from life as a way to build connection through shared experience.

Rooted in the practice of reusing and remaking materials, Meghan Rosing's childhood experiences of collaborative art-making encouraged her to regard the people around her as fellow artists and to see the whole world as ripe with materials ready to be used for projects. As a community-taught artist, she is inspired by folk and "outsider" art, especially artist-created environments. During her time in Mineral Point, she'll continue work on her portrait series "A Woman's Work Is Never Done," which includes images of headline-grabbing women like Lizzie Borden, Olive Oatman, Saint Bernadette, Typhoid Mary, and the Dionne Ouintuplets. Some of these women are famous as perpetrators of shameful deeds while others are victims of violence and kidnap, or are celebrated merely by accident of their birth.

Through the generosity of the late Jim Scherbarth who endowed the program, artists and makers will have access to the time and space needed to work and create, as well as to the nurturing environment of Mineral Point and the chance to interact with its network of resident artists. While living on the unique campus of historic and reproduction buildings, Scherbarth residents contribute in meaningful ways to the mission of Shake Rag Alley. Fatal crash in Albany

On Sunday, Feb. 9, 2025, at approximately 12:59 a.m., the Green County Sheriff's Office-Communication Center received a report of a single vehicle crash located at the intersection of English Settlement Road and Dunphy Road in the Town of Albany with serious injuries. Emergency responders were dispatched to the scene.

Preliminary investigation determined a Ford pickup truck was southbound on English Settlement Road where it proceeded through the yield controlled intersection onto Dunphy Road. The vehicle traveled across Dunphy Road where it collided with an embankment on the south side of the road and traveled up a hill striking a bank of trees before coming to rest.

The lone occupant of the vehicle was a 23-year-old man from Belleville, Wis., who was pronounced deceased on scene. Deputies were assisted on scene by Albany Fire Department, Albany EMS, and the Green County Coro-

The Milwaukee County Zoo (MCZ) is pleased to announce the safe arrival of Filly, a jaguar transferred from the Belize Zoo. Filly arrived in the evening on Thursday, Jan. 23 after leaving Belize on Jan. 22. She traveled via plane from Belize to the U.S. port in Miami before taking a ground transport straight to Milwaukee.

Filly is estimated to be between 6 to 7 years old and arrived at the Belize Zoo in 2019 after being rescued as part of the Human Jaguar Conflict Program. She was identified as a conflict jaguar – a jaguar that has been reported to be preying on livestock. They are nearly always jaguars who are older, injured or sick and unable

healthy jaguars for food and rector said. "We are proud territory. In an attempt to reduce the number of jaguar killings, the Belize Zoo, in collaboration with the Belize Forest Department, began a program in 2003 to intervene were verified to be repeated livestock predators.

After assessment and authorization, the cats are humanely trapped and safely transferred to the Belize Zoo.

MCZ was determined to be a good option for Filly due to mutual respect and trust with the Belize Zoo.

The two Zoos have a longstanding conservation partnership dating back to the 1980s. MCZ's male jaguar, Frankie, is the son of Pat, who arrived from the Belize Zoo in 2008 and was a conflict jaguar as well. MCZ and the Belize Zoo worked seamlessly to prepare for Filly's transfer, a process that took 4.5 years to complete.

MCZ, together with the Zoological Society of Milwaukee and the Belize Zoo drive conservation efforts in Belize with the Pat Gives Back program, named for Pat the Great Cat. The program focuses on capacity building, conservation and research and community support. MCZ staff work yearly with the Belize Zoo to identify workshops, hold trainings, discuss veterinary techniques, and collaborate on conservation planning and evaluation.

"We are thrilled to collaborate once again with our partners at the Belize Zoo to bring Filly to Milwaukee," Amos Morris, Milwaukee to compete successfully with County Zoo executive di-


